

Assumption Graduates Hear St. John Fisher College Head

The choice of Friedrich Nietzsche or Giuseppe Sartò (now identified as Pope Pius XII) was offered by the Very Rev. John F. Murphy, C.S.B., president of St. John Fisher College, Rochester, to graduates of Assumption College, Worcester, Mass., at a baccalaureate ceremony on June 7.

In contrast, the speaker said, the choice was between "the dead habits of materialism of the Board of Angels, the story of the pit of infinity or the shine of sanctity."

Today "intellectually, we are back in the caves and unless we are saved by loving providence we may find ourselves there physically as well."

THE FORMER registrar at Assumption (traced mental) shocks endured by men down through the years. He listed them as the Cosmic Shock when Copernicus launched his theory of the heliocentric system; Darwin's theory brought pessimism to the soul of man; the Psychological Shock caused by Freud and resulting in frustration and the Totalitarian Shock of Marx which filled the heart of man with bleak futility.

The "background has shifted to the ramparts of the human person," he said. "Our charge is the defense of the intrinsic dignity of man."

Noting the trend toward materialism and the impetus given by Nietzsche, Father Murphy said that intellectually the former appeared Hitler and the Nazis. On the other hand, he said, the man destined to become Pope Pius XII and "Blessed" had moved through life on the premise that "a man must stand for something or he will fall for anything."

"You are armed with the sword of the spirit for the conflict," the graduates were told. "Maybe you'll never succeed but you'll be judged for all eternity by the way you try to influence the minds and souls of men."
