Father Lawrence Gannon Honored On Silver Jubilee

Hornell — Parishioners and friends filed St. Ann's Church, here, Sunday for the Rev. Lawrence Gannon's Silver Jubilee Mass.
The Solemn High Mass, celebrated by the pastor at 11 a.m., was marked with traditional dignity and ceremony.
Father Gannon was commended during Mass in the sermon on the power of the Catholic priesthood by the Rev. John D. Malley, assistant pastor.
"FOR 36 YEARS," Father Malley said, "Father Gannon has been an instrument of salvation. As a successor to the apostles he has carried out the command of Christ who said, 'All power in heaven and earth is given to Me. As the Father hath sent Me, I also send you.'"
"Father Gannon has truly followed in the steps of the apostles by fulfilling the God-authorized duties in administering the sacraments," Father Malley said. "He has, through Divine authority, baptized, forgiven sins and brought the Bread of Life to countless souls."
"Great was the power of Moses when he brought forth manna in the desert," Father Malley said. "Great, also, was the power of Joshua who made the sun stand still. Far greater is the power of the priest, in whose hands bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass."
"That power," the priest added, "was conferred to the apostles on the first Good Friday Eve and has come down in the Catholic priests who followed them in unbroken line. It will be transferred from generation to generation until the end of time."
"We rejoice today," Father Malley concluded, "in the favors God, through Father Gannon, has given us. May those to whom he administers be his joy and consolation here and in heaven his everlasting crown."
The entire Mass was broadcast over Station WWHQ. The Rev. John Coonan gave the commentary. Many favorable comments have been received by Station Manager Don Curran.

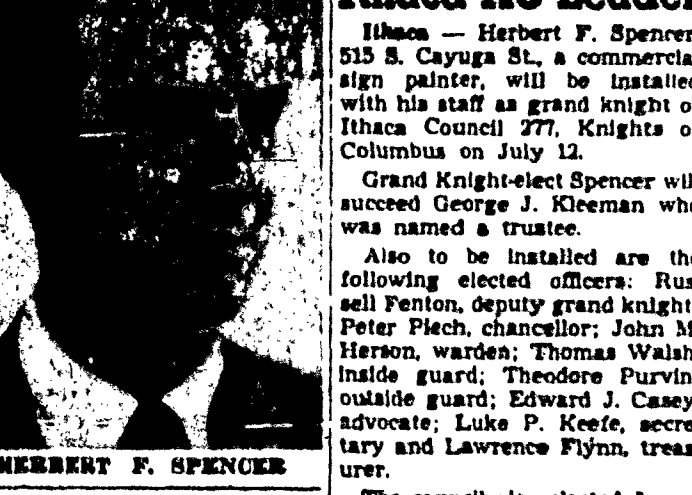

Steel Shortage Tightens Church Building Controls

Washington, D. C. — (RNS) — Exemptions from construction controls previously given churches and other non-profit institutions have been abolished by a new order tightening restrictions on new building.
The National Production Authority said that the new order is made necessary by a growing shortage of steel.
NO CHURCH building can now be erected without a permit if it is to require more than 25 tons of steel. The same restriction applies to hospitals, school and college buildings, and dormitory or residential facilities of any kind.
At the moment, no restriction other than the 25 tons of steel limitation, will apply to church, hospital, and school construction, but other restrictions are believed to be in effect as the defense program consumes more and more raw material.
Heretofore, any building designated for use as a place of religious worship was exempt from controls, as were all hospital buildings, and all school and college construction except gymnasiums and auditoriums. These special exemptions have now been entirely removed and all types of construction are placed under the same limitations.
BUILDINGS ON which construction had started by May 4, 1951, date of the order, are exempt from the new control order, and a more liberal definition of "beginning construction" has been made.
Religious or charitable organizations planning construction projects which do not fall within the new limitation may apply for a permit from the NPA. The projects must be shown to be "essential to public health, welfare, or safety" or to "alleviate hardship to a community."

Older Business Men Invited To Join In Relocating 'Father Lane's Gang'

Fifth Annual dinner meeting of "Father Lane's Gang" brought together more than 150 members and guests on June 12 at the Sutton Hotel in New York City according to "The Don Bosco Bulletin," published at Elmira Reformatory.
The unique organization, composed of former inmates of the Reformatory met on the 31st anniversary of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Francis J. Lane's ordination to the Priesthood.
Monsignor Lane, who is serving his 30th year as chaplain at the Elmira Institution proposed opening membership to business men who will aid former inmates in rehabilitation programs.
Monsignor Lane explained that the bulk of the membership is composed of younger men and a need exists for more older men to help in guidance work. The groups helps parolees become socially and emotionally adjusted to a new life and provides worthwhile friends to replace those who helped get him into trouble.
"WHAT WE NEED is to get successful business men who are really interested in helping the former inmate to make good, to act as sponsors for particular individuals, just as the older members of the gang are doing," Monsignor Lane explained.
The recent parolee has an opportunity to share his problems by joining the "gang." Monsignor Lane pointed out. He has contact with former inmates who have become successful business men and is eligible to attend monthly meetings at the Catholic Youth Organization Club in New York.
The proposal to enroll business leaders in the organization was heartily endorsed by the membership.
Guests at the affair included Edward P. Mulrooney, former state correction commissioner, and Dr. Vincent Maczola of Brooklyn, a member of the Reformatory board of managers.
Several top flight Broadway entertainers headed by Larry Ross, Betty Ann Croone, Harry Snow, Sandra Deel, Bill Treney, Mack Finnell, Herb Lane and Milton Crouse, presented a varied musical program.

Journalism Course To Open At St. Bona

St. Bonaventura, N. Y. — A six weeks' course for high school teachers and administrators entitled Journalism in Secondary Education will be offered during the coming summer season at St. Bonaventura University. It was announced today.
According to a Department of Journalism release the course is intended to prepare teachers and administrators to carry out public relations programs, to serve as advisers for high school publications, and to teach journalism.
THREE HOURS of graduate or undergraduate credit will be granted by both the Department of Journalism and the School of Education. Short field trips will be taken.
Instructor of the course will be John L. Maloney of the Department of Journalism. A graduate of the University of Notre Dame and Canisius College and a former newspaperman, Maloney served for three years as a high school publications adviser.
Registration for the summer session takes place on July 2 and classes start the following day. Final examinations will be held on August 3 and 4.

Pope Gives Audience To Myron Taylor

Valleau City — (NC) — Pope Pius XII has received in private audience Myron C. Taylor, former personal representative of President Truman to the Pontiff. The audience lasted for more than half an hour. There has been no comment or explanation regarding the nature of the discussion between the Holy Father and Mr. Taylor.
Mr. Taylor resigned as President Truman's personal representative to Pius XII in January, 1950. His audience is believed to be the first meeting he had with the Supreme Pontiff since that time. No successor to Mr. Taylor has been appointed by President Truman.
