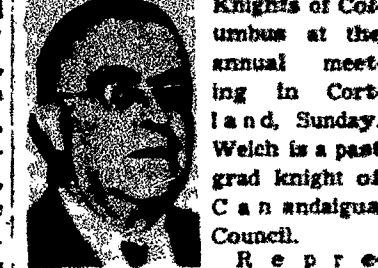
### LCBA Advisory Group Sets Willow Point Park Outing

### Priests, Nuns' Influence Against Narcotics Cited

Influence of Catholic priests and nuns in the parochial schools is a deterrent to use of narcotics by students, a front-page editorial in "The Parish Weekly" of Blessed Sacrament Church declared in the July 8th issue.

The editorial said: "Thousands of parents in New York and Chicago and elsewhere are heart-broken because of the narcotic revelations. Their sons and daughters, with ages ranging from 12 to 18 are already slavish addicts of marijuana and heroin etc. and their young lives are already morally and physically affected - perhaps for a life time."

"Nothing has developed to indicate that similar conditions have been found existing in our Catholic secondary schools and colleges. While there may possibly be individual cases in some large centers, such information Our Catholic parents should make it a matter of conscience to provide for the moral as well as the intellectual education of their sons and daughters. Regardless of the personally expressed views in the matter, those parents will be held responsible, should a tragedy happen in the lives of those for whom, in the sight of Almighty God, they will one day be held responsible.

"The scholastic standards, not only in Catholic high schools, but likewise, in Catholic colleges and universities are just as high as in those where religion may not be taught, and where the name of God is seldom or ever mentioned. "Only during the past two or three weeks it was announced that the two graduates of the Naval Academy this year, who obtained the highest percentage in their scholastic work for the year were both products of Catholic halls of learning. "Let us hope and pray that the blush of shame will not come to any Catholics for the terrible things that have already happened in the lives of thousands of public young high school boys and girls, already made known to the world."
