One hundred and eleven boys are registered at Camp Stella Maris, the diocesan summer camp on Conesus Lake in the second encampment, camp officials reported this week.

Household and Farm Workers Tax Is Due

E. J. Cappon of the Rochester office of the Collector of Internal Revenue and K. G. Haxton, manager of the local Social Security Administration office to day reminded housewives and farm operators that the Federal law requires the filing of social security tax reports on all workers covered by the new social security law.

The first tax report was due the last day of April. The second quarterly return is for April, May, and June and is due the last day of July.

Preliminary estimates indicate that about 8,400 regular household workers and 19,000 regular agricultural workers in Monroe and the surrounding four counties are covered by the new social security law. Both Mr. Cappon and Mrs. Haxton expressed the hope that all employers required by law to file tax returns on these two new groups of employees would do so before the deadline.

The camp reports one of the heaviest registrations in years. Boys from all sections in the diocese are "now enjoying many happy days above Conesus waters," the camp directors said this week.

Girls' encampments will begin on August 12.
