### Catholics Participate In World Youth Meeting

(Continued from Page 7) States of America. Many delegates found it difficult to reconcile this condition with their concept of freedom in America.

Mr. Keegan, a Catholic, led the way in forming a definite impact of right thinking during the deliberations. Again with many Catholics participating in a lively discussion the Assembly went on record as reaffirming the sacredness of marriage and the home in all parts of the world.

The question of birth control introduced by the delegates from India was firmly met by the American Catholic delegation and the subject was withdrawn from discussion on the floor of the meeting.

International relations between India, which is predominantly Hindu, and Pakistan, predominantly Moslem, already tense over the UN-debated question of Kashmir, weren't improved when Madame Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit, India's Ambassador to the United States and sister of Prime Minister Nehru of India, addressed the Assembly. Members of the Pakistan delegation took sharp issue with Madame Pandit's remarks.

Nassem Anwar Beg, head of the Pakistan delegation, criticized Madame Pandit's reference to the independence secured by Pakistan as resulting not from a "partition" of India but an "amputation." He held in rebuttal that 100 million people in Pakistan had simply refused to be reduced to a minority under the dominance of a Hindu majority.

THE PAKISTAN delegate further criticized Madame Pandit as voicing platitudes for peace and good will while she at the same time failed to mention the "massing of almost the entire Indian army on the Pakistan borders."

During one day of the meeting party airs prevailed around Willard Straight Hall—the building that was the nerve center on the campus of the World Assembly of Youth—as the Pakistan delegation to WAY observed their country's Independence Day. The fact that August 14th was the fourth anniversary and the "fourth of July" of Pakistan independence escaped no one's attention. The Pakistan delegation of nine persons added a touch of native color with flags, etc., to the dining hall for the evening meal.

Addressing the Assembly by phone from Washington, Secretary of State Dean Acheson said, "It is tragic that many people have followed the road to regimentation, thinking it offered a short cut to progress. He praised the delegates of WAY for their right thinking."

During the meeting six of the youth delegates called on President Truman at the White House. They presented the president with a silver pin, making him the first "World Ambassador" of WAY.

It was obvious to all that Catholics of all races, even those from small distant places, were acquiring themselves nobly on this world scene of youth.
