

Auburnians At Cornerstone Rite Parishioners Praised For School

WILLIAM H. NOLAN, pastor of the Holy Family Church, officiating at the cornerstone ceremony for the new St. Francis School in Auburn, N. Y., August 18. Approximately 2,000 persons attended the ceremony, which was presided over by a colorful band of musicians.

The general chairman of the ceremonies, Joseph A. Camardo, assisted by Frank Colella, James Guarrera, Dominic D'Onno and Peter Dec.

TAKING PART in the parade were the Knights of St. John, Commandery of St. Alphonsus Church and the widely-known, Carniol-Indelicato Drum and Bugle Corps, popularly known as the Purple Lancers.

Religious ceremonies began with a procession of the clergy from the rectory to the school. As master of ceremonies, the Rev. Joseph Beattini, assistant pastor of St. Francis Church called upon the Rev. John Nacca, pastor of Holy Family, for their cooperation, their prayers and their financial support in making the school possible. He made his parishioners a solemn promise that their children would be trained in the new school to be citizens of two worlds.

"God and His Blessed Mother must be very proud of you this afternoon," Father Nacca told his audience. "For you have given them a school in which the ideals so dear to their hearts will be taught. He promised that the children of the new school would have the best educational facilities available. He particularly thanked Mayor Edward F. Boyle for his help during the months of construction. "The Mayor never once failed me!" said the pastor.

MAYOR BOYLE in his congratulations, declared that Auburn was proud of the people of St. Francis in building this school, which he described as a monument to them. He praised Father Nacca and his efforts for the parishioners and especially for his work in connection with the new school.

Monsignor Conway, principal speaker, congratulated the parishioners on seeing their dream realized after long months of hard work. The Dean declared that the children of the new St. Francis School would receive an education over and above that of secular education.

The prelate scored those who use the so-called principle of church and state to dissociate religion from education. Monsignor Conway invoked the prayerful protection of the Blessed Mother, under the title of Our Lady of Lourdes, whose shrine faces the school and he asked Mary to petition her Divine Son to bestow his choicest blessings on the priests, sisters and children as well as on the people of the parish on this important occasion.

IMMEDIATELY AFTER the cornerstone ceremony there was solemnized Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament in both the Church and Chapel of St. Francis in the Church. The Rev. John B. Crowley, pastor of the neighboring St. Aloysius Church was celebrant, with the Rev. Kieran Hickey, O. C. M., as deacon, and the Rev. William Ayers of Aurora as subdeacon. Father Nacca was master of ceremonies.

In the chapel, the Rev. Jerome Holubowicz, pastor of St. Hyacinth's Church, was celebrant, with the Rev. Leo Jones of Weedsport as deacon, and the Rev. Marshall McMahon of Skaneateles as subdeacon. Father Beattini was master of ceremonies.

The following priests were also in attendance: the Rev. Bernard Daly, O. C. M., prior of White Pines Monastery, Father Edward of St. Hyacinth's, the Rev. Edward Tolster and the Rev. Shop School Slates Registration Aug. 27

With the fall term at Edison Technical and Industrial High School set to start Sept. 5 a classification examination and registration will take place Monday, August 27 at 9 a. m.

The school gives instruction in 15 different trades in 23 shops using modern equipment which is a duplicate of the equipment used in many factories here in town.

All boys in addition to the half day of shop, get the regular high school instruction in English, social studies, mathematics, drawing and science.

The efficiency with which the school trains the boys to the satisfaction of the employers may be indicated, according to Principal Howard S. Bennett, in that at the close of school, 90 per cent of the boys had already made application to college, some had been accepted by the armed forces or were employed by the industries in Rochester.

Modernly Equipped School Awaits St. Francis Pupils

Auburn — The new St. Francis School which will be blessed by His Excellency Bishop Kearney, sometime in September at a date to be announced, is completely modern in design and construction. The most minute feature of its many accommodations reveals the concern of the planners to achieve a happy combination of convenience and efficiency.

The classrooms, all on one floor, are finished in two colors. In half of the rooms, Egyptian green predominates, and in the others a soft shade of apricot hue has been used. In each room the respective color scheme is carried out in all accessories and in the tile floors. The corridors are finished in pastel green.

Each classroom has a sloped ceiling for extra light. Electrical fixtures are the striped fluorescent type. Green slate boards have replaced the traditional black board, although the standard white chalk will remain. Desks with tops adjustable to three levels have been provided.

The kindergarten, done in canary yellow with matching furniture and woodwork of a natural oak finish, features an all glass wall, thus creating the maximum in light, cheery effect. Cabinets for the storage of toys have also been installed.

In the basement, there is a roomy auditorium combined with fully equipped kitchen and cafeteria facilities. The entire basement has a floor of asphalt tile with acoustic walls and ceilings. All kitchen equipment is of stainless steel with formica counter and table tops featured in the cafeteria.

A built-in stage with full equipment and dressing rooms are an important feature of the auditorium. Folding doors designed to shut off smaller rooms for meetings of parish societies have also been provided. Necessary boiler and utility rooms, storage space and janitor's closet have been so planned and arranged that they do not interfere with the auditorium and cafeteria layout.

The landscaping of the school grounds has been planned to enhance the attractive features of both school and church. A beautiful shrine of Our Crucified Saviour has been centered in a sidewalk arrangement symbolic of a key which, the Rev. John Nacca, pastor, points out represents the Catholic principle that religious education is the key to temporal and eternal happiness.

Edward Rook of Syracuse is the architect of the school, and Nicholas Goffredo is superintendent of works.

The faculty of the school will be composed of the Dominican Sisters, who have done catechetical and social service work in the parish for many years, and the Sisters of the Religious Community of Jesus and Mary. For the latter group, a completely equipped and well-furnished convent, with an attractive little chapel featuring a small liturgical altar, has been provided. The Trinitarian Sisters will retain the same convent they have occupied in years past.

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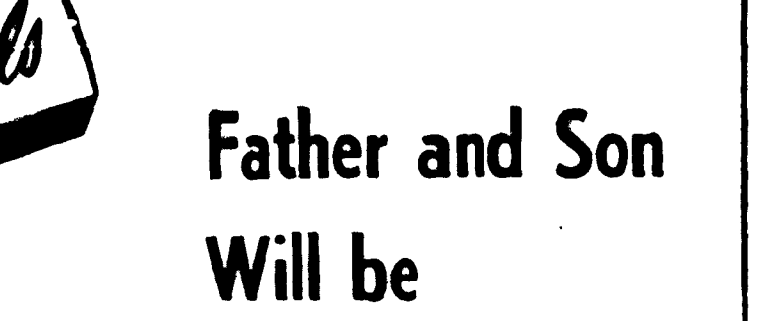
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
