Vatican's Sacred Relic

A very charming, possibly true, story is told of a non-Catholic visitor to the Vatican in the days of Pius IX. The visitor, having been received by His Holiness, asked as a special favor if he might see some of the Vatican treasures.

Rosary, held it out and said, "Behold the richest and most sacred relic of the Vatican." The return to this treasure—the ever increasing number who are saying the Rosary daily, the spread of Rosary devotions—all seem to me to be one of the most heartening signs in a world of fears and alarms.

As I notice more and more people reciting their Rosary I wonder if each has taken advantage of the marvelous indulgences offered to Catholics enrolled in the Confraternity of the Most Holy Rosary or the Rosary Altar Society.

THROUGHOUT the centuries Holy Father after Holy Father has enriched membership in this Confraternity by granting many indulgences. A partial list of these covers several pages of close print.

The conditions for membership are so simple that all who are devoted to the Rosary—and what Catholic is not—should enjoy the rich benefits.

The only requisite for becoming a member is to be inscribed in the book of the Confraternity. There are no membership dues or charges of any kind.

For obtaining its advantages a confraternity member must recite once a week the whole Rosary the 15 decades using blessed beads and meditating on the mysteries. The decades may be said at different times.

When two or more persons say the Rosary together it is enough that one should use the beads. This obligation of reciting the Rosary does not bind in conscience, but omitting to do so deprives one of a share in the privileges of the Confraternity.

MANY PARISHES have confraternities to which the women belong but there are many who do not belong to these parish affiliations. If your parish has such a Confraternity you may enroll your name there. If not, we have a house of Dominican Sisters in this diocese.

Write the Dominican Monastery of the Perpetual Rosary, 1310 West Church Street, Elmira, and ask that your name be inscribed in their Confraternity book.

All the indulgences except the Plenary at the hour of death are applicable to the Souls in Purgatory. To those of us who have so many dear ones in eternity this is an opportunity of showing to them our love and gratitude.
