After That Sigh of Relief

"And a spirit of abandonment on the first day of school some parents do little or no thinking about the whole matter of schooling until suddenly some urgent problem confronting one of their children is thrown in their laps. This some of you read I hope if your paper for mailed a copy of "Rules for Schooling" to you.

This small pamphlet published by the Liguoritan Office contains much food for thought and perhaps a little incentive to action. It isn't too late of course, to transfer your child to a parochial school, if you have without legitimate reasons, entered him in a "godless public school."

Parents for the most part are divided into two classes those, who sigh with relief on the first day of school and then relax and the others, who also sigh, but who interest and meddle too much. In these days of registration, we readily agree with our little leaflet, in the statement that there is need of rules that parents can study and adopt for their own conduct in regard to their children's schooling.

WITH ALL DUE respect to our Catholic parents, it seems that the three basic facts set down in this leaflet reflect the mistakes made because fathers and mothers "know nothing about these rules of act contrary to them."

First and I quote, the primary right and duty of education rests on parents. They may and must choose a school, who subject matter conforms to their beliefs of a good and complete education.

Second, Parents are delegating some of their teaching authority in the school "Some" because while the school does not completely take over the task of the parents, the parents still do not have the right to interfere at will with the child's teachers.

Third and I quote, you are possibly your best case some of you are so certain that the teacher, particularly one who is a

parent, is always wrong. "Parents must back up the authority of the school." Now, as you look back on those telephone conversations last year your child's complaints and your emotional responses, do you honestly want to repeat all that this year? If not, you will, I know be interested in the practical rules for your guidance, contained in this same leaflet.

After your rugged summer no one will criticize you for your honest "sigh of relief" but I remind you "It is exceedingly important that a child be convinced that his parents stand behind the school that he must obey study practice good behavior.

Interest in report cards to the point of convincing your child that "his progress and behavior in school are closely watched by you" is the next level.

Never take sides openly against the authorities at school. This is one of the worst of all dangers. Just as you are not a perfect parent, so your child's teacher may not always be a perfect teacher. Understand this and don't bother to bustle it a true!

NO YOUR DARLING is not always right, so check his stay of all treatment at the hands of teachers carefully. Did you sometimes say "Our child would never do such a thing." Did you in unfairness go to the school principal or the pastor without first talking over the matter with the teacher herself. How about homework? Show your attitude toward it shows your child that parental and school authority are one.

All of this supervision and cooperation, however, can not be carelessly laid aside at the end of the school day. Supervise your child when he is not in school, know the children selected by him for friends. And the easiest way to maintain vigilance in that area is to make certain that he brings his friends to his own home. Then you will have a chance to meet and know them and if necessary to disapprove of them.

Our pulpits resounded with similar admonitions on the first Sunday in September. As in the days when our Divine Saviour walked the earth, "Some of the seed fell by the wayside" however. The word of God for many parents does not include an understanding of the "Rules for Schooling." But for those of you for whom it does, again the seed fell upon good ground and growing up will yield fruit a hundred fold! Then and only then, will the children, whom God gave into your keeping blossom into a manhood and womanhood worthy of the glorious heritage of their Catholic Faith and Catholic Education.
