Day With Catholic Charities Worker

Faced with the question of interpreting the program of Catholic Charities to you and conscious of the questions that are so often raised in regard to Private Family Agencies, we want to tell you a little about our role in promoting sound Family Life.

We would like to convince you that our Red Feather Agency helps people to meet family and personal problems that trouble them and thus enables them to attain much that is vital to happy living for children, adults, and for the community and the nation.

Obligated to maintain every principle of confidentiality, we must confine our story to general problems, and carefully disguise all identifying data.

PICKING UP the daily report of one Case Worker, let's follow her through one day. Anything can happen in our office any day, but Friday usually wins. It's our Clinic Day at St. Joseph's Hospital. (And incidentally, we post promptly to our Clinic as the only one of its kind in the Community.) It isn't only the financial saving to the Chest and the Agency, which amounts to more than \$200 each month, but it's the case work value of such a plan instead of the usual hospitalization, which would be just one more source of disturbance to a foster child, in particular.

10:40—Thank Heavens the O'Brien live nearby. Some people think we aren't moving fast enough on this wish they knew how difficult it is to find a housekeeper to take charge of a home and six children during the long hospitalization of the mother. Jennie, the housekeeper, needed some moral support that day as did Mr. O'Brien in finding it easy to accept his problems. By next week he may agree to a trip to the Psychiatric Clinic. His depression worries me.

11:45 Three fruitless calls. No one home. I'll have to try them all tomorrow.

The Doctor says Mrs. McCarthy must have dentures if she gets through this pregnancy and has a normal baby. And it certainly won't do any good for me to get a Big Brother for Jimmy unless I can convince his Mother that she must be a little more vigilant about his comings and goings other wise his next going will be right back to that State Institution.

12:30 Looks like a half hour for lunch. If I am lucky. Wonder if any of the rest of the staff ever get that hour and a quarter we're supposed to have. This was my afternoon for dictation and the boss will expect me to make it up. I wonder when if this goes on forever. 1:00 Just 45 minutes and all the "play things" for our first demonstration of play therapy had to be assembled. The psychologist was arriving at 4 o'clock and everything had to be in readiness.

time remembering that I had to be back to meet Mr. James at 4 o'clock.

3:30—Right on the minute—where was Michael? A call to the school disclosed the fact—that the bus was held up because of a football game—No Michael—a long distance call to Mr. James who graciously explained that he could use the time to assemble the plan equipment.

4:10 Enroute to the office—Heavens Did I order out the travelling outfits for the two infants—I have to pick up in Rochester tomorrow? Would I get back in time to have the car checked at the garage?

4:45 Back in the office. Clothing for baby ready. Car in garage for check up. Nothing much except several telephone calls that had to be returned.

Reports Catholic Killed In Korea

Word was received this week that PFC Marvin C. Enright, a Catholic soldier, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Enright, 706 Linden Street, was killed in action in Korea August 28, 1951.

The soldier enlisted in the Army for three years Dec. 29, 1950. In May he was shipped to Korea. He fought with the 9th Infantry Regiment of the famed 2nd division. In the last letter received by his parents he said he expected to be home for Christmas. Prior to his enlistment he was employed at the Star Market on Dowsy Ave. and then as a roofing contractor.

Besides his parents he is survived by five sisters, Mrs. Robert Wetzlaw, Mrs. William York, Mrs. Everett Quackenbush, Jean and Elaine and five brothers, Thomas, Francis, William, Donald, and Cpl. James Enright. All but Thomas are veterans of World War 2.
