

Says Bishop Byrne May Be Held Near Church He Built

Bishop Patrick J. Byrne, Apostolic Delegate to Korea and now a captive of the Korean Reds, may be held near a church he once built and of which he was pastor for some time according to NCWC News Service.

This was noted here by Dr. Louis P. Chang, brother of South Korean Prime Minister John M. Chang. Asia's only Catholic premier, Louis Chang is now in the United States doing research in western art and studying the American educational system.

Dr. Chang made the point about Bishop Byrne in relating that he himself painted a mural of the descent of the Holy Ghost in the church in 1928 shortly after it had been built by the then Father Byrne, a Washington-born Maryknoller.

The church is located in Sinululu border city between Manchuria and North Korea. The city served as the temporary North Korean capital after the capture by United Nations forces of Pyongyang. It still is a key artery for shuttling war supplies from Manchuria to the North Korean front.

Dr. Chang recalled that Father Byrne, then an energetic 40-year-old missionary, had great difficulty in getting the church built. He had both Chinese and Koreans working on the church, and had then not mastered

either language, the Korean scholar said. The church itself, he related, is a combination of oriental and western architecture. The roofing and facade followed oriental traditions, while the interior and the erection of a bell tower gave it an occidental touch.

Bishop Byrne spent his boyhood days in Auburn and served Mass in Holy Family Church in that city.

Cardinal To Lead Tour To Spain

His Eminence, Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, will personally lead a pilgrimage to the first post-war International Eucharistic Congress, to be convened in Barcelona, Spain from May 27 to June 1, 1952.

Cardinal Spellman and 600 pilgrims will sail from New York on May 16, 1952 in the S. S. Constitution of American Export Lines. The members will live aboard the Constitution while in Barcelona to participate in the Congress.

Enroute to Barcelona the Constitution will visit Ponta Delgada (Azores), Lisbon, Portugal where the members will disembark to visit the world famous Shrine of Our Lady of Fatima, and Cadiz, Spain, where they will again go ashore to visit picturesque Seville.

After the congress ends the Constitution will sail to Cannes, France, Genoa and Naples. The group will leave the ship for a three day visit to Rome where they will be received in audience by His Holiness, Pope Pius XII. After the members embark again in Naples the Constitution will visit Gibraltar before sailing for New York where she will arrive on June 16.

What ABC Means To Readers -- Advertisers

The Catholic Courier Journal has frequently referred to its membership in the Audit Bureau of Circulations, but seldom has it paused to explain the interesting history and importance of this association.

This bureau although not widely known to the general public, is recognized by authorities on the progress of American business as having played a major part in the growth and success of modern merchandising.

Like many other things, ABC was born out of necessity at a time when publishers of newspapers and periodicals had no generally accepted or standardized means of telling advertisers about their circulation. There were no standards for circulation values.

Likewise, there was no standard method of accounting for or auditing the circulation that publishers claimed. The honest publisher who claimed 50,000 was at a distinct disadvantage in meeting the claims of a competitor who might claim 75,000 but actually have only 25,000.

IN ADDITION to audited figures the advertisers began to ask for more information concerning circulations. Where does it go? How much do people pay for it? The answers to these and other questions, of course, have an important bearing on the publication's value to advertisers.

Forming of Catholic Civics Clubs Urged By School Head

Every school in the Diocese of Rochester has been urged to establish a Catholic Civics Club by the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, diocesan superintendent of schools.

The Catholic Civics Club, Father Mahoney said, will this year undertake a program, centered around the vital human rights theme developed at the 1951 convention of the National Catholic Educational Association.

Sponsored by the Commission on American Citizenship of the Catholic University of America, the Clubs foster training for good citizenship among students of parochial junior high schools. In the past year alone more than 1,400 units were chartered. These organizations cover all the 48 states as well as Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

IN A LETTER to principals of schools in this diocese, Father Mahoney noted that the Clubs "already have proved their value as media for the teaching of right Christian social principles."

This year the Commission on American Citizenship has set up for Civics Club members a program of study and action designed to acquaint them more fully with their community and its problems.

The Young Catholic Messenger, national weekly for parochial junior high school students, cooperation with the Commission by publishing a series of articles dealing with these topics. This widely used current events weekly is published by Gen. A. Zahm, Publisher, Inc., of Dayton, Ohio.
