Hollywood In Focus

Only One Line Fulfills Red Menace Requirement

"The immediate objective of a Communist hard core in Hollywood is to bore itself into control of the Screen Writers Guild."

In 1945 I used these words from public platforms throughout the Middle West. I named writers involved in the W. E. Moorings. Some of these have since been proved before the Un-American Activities Committee to have held membership in the Communist Party.

"HAVING been halted in their plans to get direct Communist propaganda into the movies, the Hollywood 'lefties' now are working towards the inoculation of screenplays with ideas not directly identifiable with Red propaganda but which help Communism just the same. . . . Instead of making more films to appeal to the average American family, some studio bosses are scrambling for stories in which violence, crime, social unrest and political intrigue predominate. This gives the Hollywood leftists—many of them are found on the levels of the literati—their great opportunity."

In 1947 and again in 1948 and 1949, I made this statement from public platforms throughout the U.S.A. and parts of Canada. I named men and mentioned many films to support my argument. . . . Without let-up, this column, alone without let-up, this column, alone among those appearing in the Catholic press, has been hammering at the sources of pro-Soviet infection in the movie industry. Now at last, witnesses such as Leo Townsend and Martin Berkeley, self-confessed members of the Communist Party and one-time participants in the Red conspiracy have given under oath, evidence which confirms in detail my earlier findings.

BOTH TOWNSEND and Berkeley have suggested that the Hollywood Reds never succeeded in gaining control of the content of motion pictures. It is undeniable, however, that they succeeded in exercising nefarious influence through a number of screenplays.

Films such as "Song of Russia," "The Best Years of Our Lives," "In Our Time," "North Star," "We Were Strangers," "Mission to Moscow," "All the King's Men" and many others are now being re-examined by some of the Hollywood "brass." In the light of what has been uncovered by the Congressional committee, leading film produc-

ers now detect political subtleties and sinister designs to which our reviews and comments relative to these films made reference when they first appeared.

The bee which many people suspected we harbored in our bonnet has stung a few Hollywood moguls into action.

AT THE HEAD of at least two major studios are men who have shared membership with exposed Communists in several left-front organizations.

These men may well have since withdrawn. They may have rejected any part in the conspiracy. In fact, they were ever involved in it, but if so they have not volunteered to appear before the Un-American Activities Committee, or taken any other steps publicly to declare their present stand. Instead they seem to throw doubt on the seriousness of the Communist threat.

The most recent exposures deal with Communists who have been employed in the movies; not with those who gave them employment while having full knowledge of their pro-leftist affiliations. If not of their subversive involvements.

Even as the committee explodes public sensations one writer with a long list of left front activities, slips into a beautiful and completely "non-political" film, just one line that is typical of the indirect suggestion against which we must now double our guard.

Two characters are discussing a rebellious child. One asks what is to be done with him. To stop rebellion one must remove the causes of rebellion, replies the other. The line of dialogue departs from the specific and goes into a generality.

Moreover it is as easily identifiable as a Communist rabble call as it is that tune which Communist actor Lionel Stander whistled, all casual like, in one of his films. Innocently associated in this country with "Oh Maryland," the tune is known to all European Communists as a party rally song called "The Red Flag." It has been used in several films.

THE LINE about rebellion occurs in "The Blue Veil," written by Norman Corwin. He may or may not be called to testify before the Un-American Activities Committee. Whether he is or not he is one of a considerable number of Hollywood people whose past affiliations need a thorough going over by such leaders of the motion picture industry as honestly propose a fearless and complete investigation of subversive influence in Hollywood. Let the heads fall where they may.

First Saturday

On the first Saturday in October, the eve of the Feast of the Most Holy Rosary, Auburn Diocesan Council will sponsor the first of a series of First Saturday Luncheons in honor of Our Lady of Fatima. In so doing Auburn joins the growing lists of cities and towns in the Diocese who have these luncheons.

The purpose is to honor Our Blessed Mother, to answer her appeals, made at Fatima, and to call the attention of others to these. At a recent meeting of the Diocesan Council Board of Directors held at Geneva, women from the various deaneries and districts reported on the success of these luncheons in bringing before the community the pleas and promises of Fatima.

THE PLAN is very simple. The women receive Holy Communion in the various parish churches and then later in the day gather for a luncheon, the highest point of which is a talk, generally given a priest, on some phase of the Blessed Mother's life and her place in our lives.

The Auburn luncheon will be held at the Osborne Hotel where the manager in a spirit of gracious cooperation has arranged a

luncheon menu at a price all can afford. In keeping with its policy of not being a money-making organization, the Diocesan Council is absorbing all expenses attendant on the luncheon and is charging those attending just what the hotel is asking as a luncheon price. This, I believe, is as it should be.

The conditions of the First Saturday devotion gathered from the Fatima apparitions include five decades of the Rosary, a Communion of reparation, a prayer, and some sacrifice made for the same intention.

THE DEVOTION of the First Saturday devotion includes the novenas listed for the First Saturdays above, and also confessions and a fifteen-minute meditation on the Mysteries of the Rosary. Confession may be in the eight days preceding or following the Saturday; and the intention, if

beginning, may be made at any time on the first Saturday. The devotion may include the five decades of the Rosary, a Communion of reparation, a prayer, and some sacrifice made for the same intention.
