

Niagara U. Lists Faculty Changes

Annual faculty changes at Niagara University will bring four priests to the Niagara campus and will release five others for duties elsewhere, according to the Very Rev. Daniel M. Leary, V.C.M., provincial of the Eastern Province of Vincentian fathers.

Among those leaving Niagara are the Rev. Joseph M. O'Donnell, C.M., vice-rector of Our Lady of Angels' seminary, who will be stationed at Mary Immaculate Seminary, Northampton, Pa., the Rev. Hugh F. O'Donnell, C.M., of the department of philosophy, who has been assigned to St. Joseph's College, Emmitsburg, Md.; the Rev. John E. Savage, C.M., of the department of modern languages, recently assigned to the Panama missions; the Rev. James J. Murphy, C.M., of the department of mathematics and physics to the Germantown, Pa., mission and the Rev. Norbert F. Geis, C.M., department of modern languages to Catholic University.

The Very Rev. Francis L. Meade, C.M., president of the University in a correlative statement announced the appointment of four lay professors to the university staff.

They are Mrs. Virginia Kiehl, M.A., a graduate of Columbia University who will teach in the department of obstetrics in the College of Nursing; Richard C. Doherty, LL.B., St. John's University, department of English; and Lawrence J. State, A.B., Canisius College, department of philosophy and Edward J. McKeegan, St. John's University, department of biology.

Station Broadcasts Rosary in Spanish

Fresno, Cal. (RNS)—Catholic families of central California are participating in a unique Spanish Rosary Program broadcast six nights each week over Station KGST here.

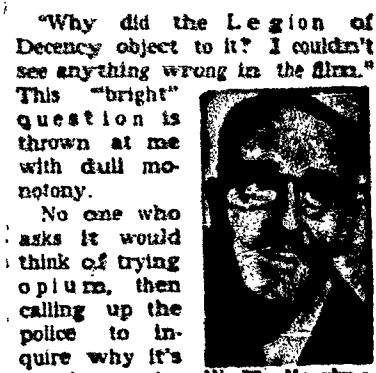

A Pledge That Makes Us All Members of the Legion



"Why did the Legion of Decency object to it? I couldn't see anything wrong in the film." This "bright" question is thrown at me with dull monotony.

No one who asks it would think of trying to explain, then calling up the police to inquire why it's against the law, because I couldn't taste anything peculiar about it! It's the same thing you know.

WHAT SUCH people are doing when their pastors administer the annual Legion of Decency pledge in the churches is hard to imagine. They evidently aren't listening; much less sincerely repeating the terms of the pledge. For they often ask, "who are the members of the Legion of Decency?"

They are quite startled, poor things, when one replies that as long as they took the pledge, as they ought to do, THEY are members of the Legion.

The Legion has functioned for almost 20 years. May it not be time to consider a coast-to-coast campaign to re-invigorate and reinforce among a new generation of Catholic youth, the resolves which first brought the Legion of Decency into existence?

Screen writer Charles Schnee set people talking with his screenplay "The Next Voice You Hear" in which God supposedly spoke over the radio in a mysterious way.

Many said that the messages didn't add anything to what God, in the person of Our Lord said while on earth. Others enjoyed the film but thought it passed off humanitarianism as religion, which, indeed, it did.

Charles Schnee and Dore Schary of MGM who produced the picture admitted they had tried to entertain people without running any risks of offending separated sects. They'd given the movie a good feeling which they hoped might incidentally encourage the practice of brotherly love, but they knew they'd ignored the supernatural.

NOW CHARLES Schnee has developed an original story idea by Robert Buckner and again MGM has produced it with Clarence Brown, who just directed "Angels in the Outfield."

It's a comedy called "When in Rome" and the story runs like this:

A young American priest (played by Van Johnson) goes on the Holy Year Pilgrimage to Rome. On the boat is a crook running away from the law. He's played by Paul Douglas.

When the boat docks at Genoa the crook sees police waiting on the dock so he steals the priest's clothes and makes his getaway. The priest is arrested but soon clears himself. The crook, meanwhile, goes to Rome where the priest eventually catches up with him. Before that, however, he has some amusing adventures; a few less funny ones too.

This idea of simulation proved a tricky one. It's risky business to show a layman posing as a priest because there's not much he can do without barging into the sacristy.

DON'T TAKE this as a review of the film because as yet nobody has seen it. Schnee tells me, however, that with the help of various priests, here and in Rome where the film was made, the studio people managed to avoid any situations in which the crook, while posing as a priest, pretended to administer the sacraments.

It will be interesting to see how they got him out of attempting to say Mass. He almost got into trouble one day. While he was visiting St. John Lateran with a party of pilgrims, a woman begged him to hear her confession. He squirmed, stammered and went red in the face. Then on a flash of inspiration he cupped his hands and shouted "Father O'Leary!" whereupon priests came hurrying from all sides: He waved the woman towards them, made a quick exit and the situation was saved.

"At least when you see this film," says Charles Schnee, "you'll have no doubt what particular religion we're talking about."

Most of it was shot in Rome and shows St. Peter's, St. John Lateran, parts of the Vatican and the Colosseum where the crook finally makes an act of contrition and returns to the Faith.

Wilford Scott will direct the first series.



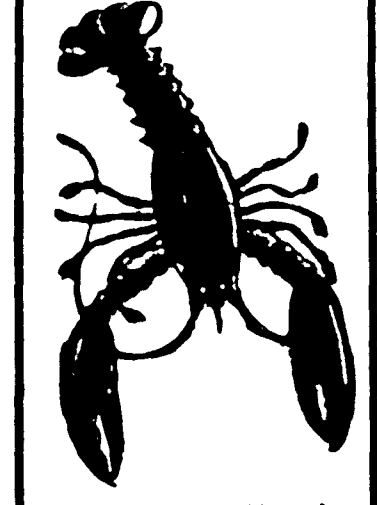
