Four modernized units including obstetrics, pharmacy and laboratory will be provided for Mercy Hospital, here, when renovation and remodeling of the south wing of the old hospital building by Stewart and Rowley is completed.

Funeral services for Sister M. Clara, of the Sisters of Mercy, who died in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Elmira, on Oct. 18, were held Friday, Oct. 19, at St. Mary's Church.

Funeral Mass of Requiem was celebrated in Holy Family Chapel at St. Mary's Church, Elmira, at 10 a. m. by Rev. Magr. Wilfred W. Craigh, assisted by Rev. Edward J. Lantz, Deacon; Rev. William J. Surviving are three brothers, Joseph, George, and Frank Reenan; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Ailman, Miss Cecilia Reenan, and Mrs. Lucy Mellens, all of Rochester; also a number of nieces and nephews.

This was announced in an article by Joseph R. Cullen, secretary of the board of directors in the October issue of Mercy Echoes of St. James, hospital publication.

When the work is finished the maternity section will occupy the second floor of the old south wing. The delivery suite will be located in the old, and the nursery will occupy the space formerly used as an operating room.

UNDER THIS arrangement, visitors to the hospital may view the nursery and its occupants without entering the maternity section of the hospital and the delivery section will be remote and removed from all corridor traffic.

On the first floor, the patient space formerly occupied by maternity will be the Pediatric department, and the area formerly used as an emergency room will be made available to the x-ray department for offices and records, and a new pharmacy room will be set up nearby.

The former kitchen area is now being renovated and remodeled for the use of the County Laboratory. The new laboratory will have more than 1200 square feet of space together with office space and complete new furnishings and equipment.

Work on the renovation of the south wing is expected to be completed by the end of the current year.

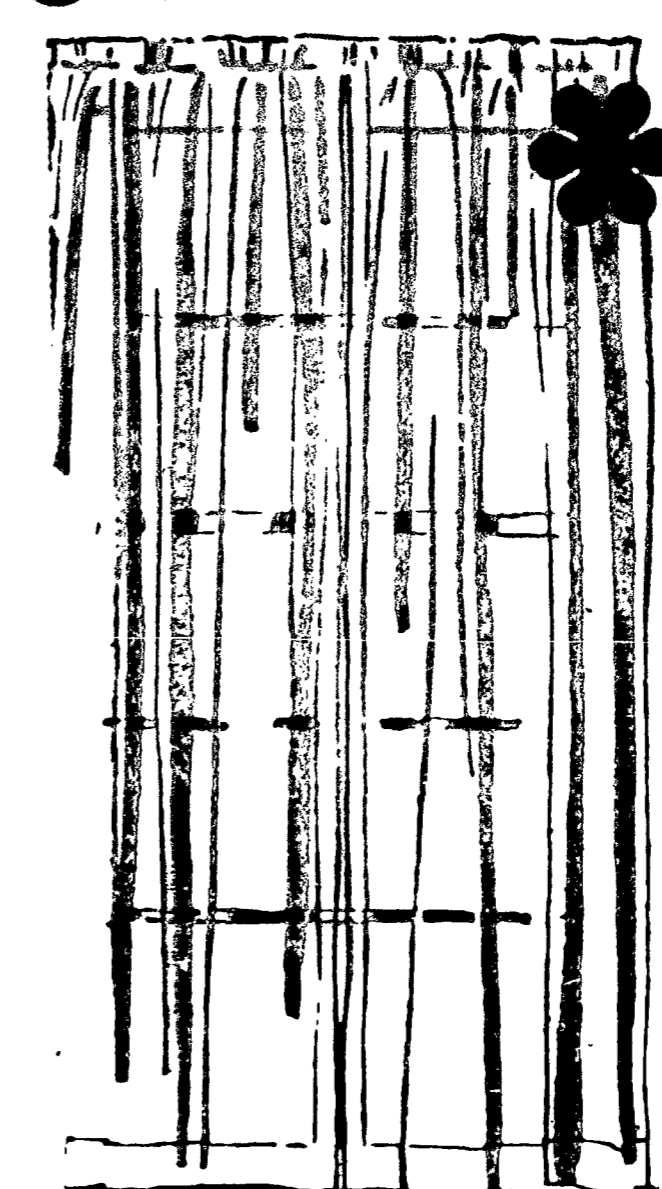
