**Gospel Seen
Spur To Labor
Class Progress**

Basel, Switzerland — (NC) —
The delivery of the working
classes from bondage is to a
large extent due to the influence
of the Gospel and of the Church,
says the Swiss Hierarchy in a
joint pastoral.

Without doubt, say the Swiss
bishops, many a law adopted
in both America and Europe
for the betterment of working
conditions goes back to the
initiative of Catholics. Many
Catholics themselves are not
aware of this fact, which ex-
plains why the working classes
often see a lack of under-
standing of their problems on
the part of the Church.

"WE MUST not let the view
gain ground as though the
thought of heaven might deter
men from improving conditions
on earth," the pastoral goes on.
"The very opposite is true."
We refuse to choose between a
concern for heaven and a con-
cern for the earth. We have
opposed to materialistic philo-
sophies because they deny God
and the immortal soul of man,
but also because they are unable
to make this earth more inhabi-
table and mankind more brotherly.

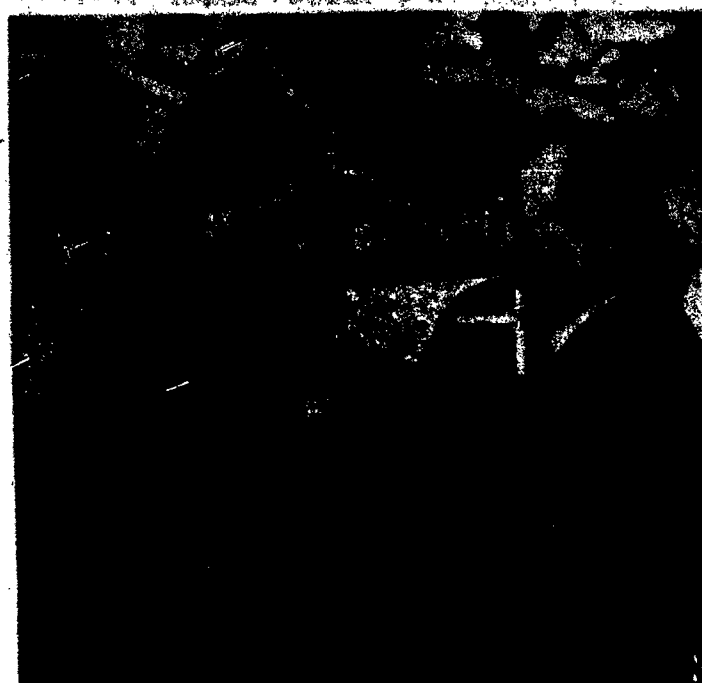
At the same time, the pastoral
says, Catholics must search their
own consciences and give an ex-
ample to non-believers. Then
only can the Church hope to win
over those who now oppose her,
the bishops point out.

"With the grace of God, they
will then understand that we are
not the agents of some earthly
imperialism, but the representa-
tives of Christ the Saviour, even
though often we fall far short of
our duty," the pastoral con-
cludes.

**German Clergy Aid
Homeland Missions**

Munich — (NC) — Every Ger-
man priest, including the Bish-
ops, contributes three per cent
of his salary for home missions.
This is revealed here in con-
nection with the release of statistics
showing that over 6 million Ger-
man Catholics now reside in di-
spora districts. Only 3,800
priests are available to attend to
their spiritual needs.

German Catholics raise some
\$6 million Marks, (about \$1,500,
000) annually for the propaga-
tion of the Faith. It is pointed
out in this connection that 18,000
of a total of nearly 25,000 mem-
bers of the German Catholic
clergy are engaged in parish
work.

The average German parish
now must look after 1,300 souls,
as compared to 1,300 in 1915.
Conversions to the Catholic
Faith averaged 20,000 during the
period of 1946-1949.

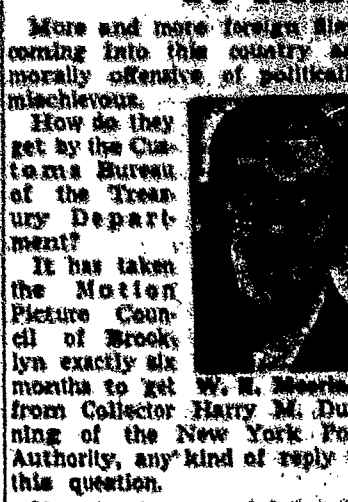

Hollywood In Focus

**A Decent Challenge
To Rossellini 'Art'**

More and more foreign films
coming into this country are
morally offensive, of politically
mischievous.

How do they
get by the Custom
Bureau of the Treas-
ury Department?
It has taken
the Motion
Picture Coun-
cil of Brook-
lyn exactly six
months to get
from Collector Harry M. Dun-
ning of the New York Port
Authority, any kind of reply to
this question.

Now he has ceased being a
"Brooklyn dodger" all Mr. Dun-
ning has to say is that "careful
examination is made of all im-
ported films and any material
violative of the Import Laws is
not permitted entry."

The law (Section 305 of the
Tariff Act 1930) requires the
Collector of Customs "to pro-
hibit from importation, motion
picture film that is treasonable,
invites insurrection against the
United States . . . or is consid-
ered obscene or immoral."

A single Customs official has
power to decide when a film is
obscene or immoral within the
meaning of this Act.

WHESTER defines as obscene
"anything offensive to chastity
of mind or to modesty . . . of-
fensive to taste . . . loathsome
or disgusting."

Evidently such films as "Bil-
ter Rice," "The Miracle," "La
Ronde," "Oh Amelia," and
"L'Affaire," just to mention just
a few, were not considered to be
offensive, to chastity of mind or
to modesty.

Yet admitting a generous area
of personal disagreement, it has
been demonstrated publicly that
large numbers of people are of-
fended by them. In most cases
theater owners booking these
pictures have done so delibera-
tely to pander to depraved taste.

The Motion Picture Council of
Brooklyn suggests that a
Board of Review of at least three
impartial and competent mem-
bers, preferably of different per-
suasions, so that no one Customs
official shall be permitted ar-
bitrarily to decide which par-
ticular foreign films meet the re-
quirements of the Import Laws.

The Brooklyn proposal de-
serves the active support of mo-
tion picture organizations all over
the U.S.A. Certain European
Reds are getting their movies by
U.S. Customs. They have friends
here who are always ready to
book them into American thea-
ters.

The dirtier and more danger-
ous these films are, the more
widely they are publicized and
shown.

SPEAKING of foreign films
brings me to a letter I just re-
ceived from Una O'Connor, Cath-
olic actress of stage, screen, radio
and television whose consis-
tent practice never to accept a
role in any dubious play sets a
high example for the Catholic
stars of Hollywood to follow.

In New York a few weeks
ago, Una received an offer from
an Italian movie director-pro-
ducer named Vassorelli. He'd
seen her in a Hollywood film
shown in Rome.

"All negotiations were by
cable or phone," writes Una,
"and there was no time for me
to get the script. All I knew was
that Barry Fitzgerald was play-
ing."

MONSIGNOR SPLAINE

Monsignor Spline, president of
the Catholic Summer School of
America and rector of the
Boston Archdiocese from 1947 to
