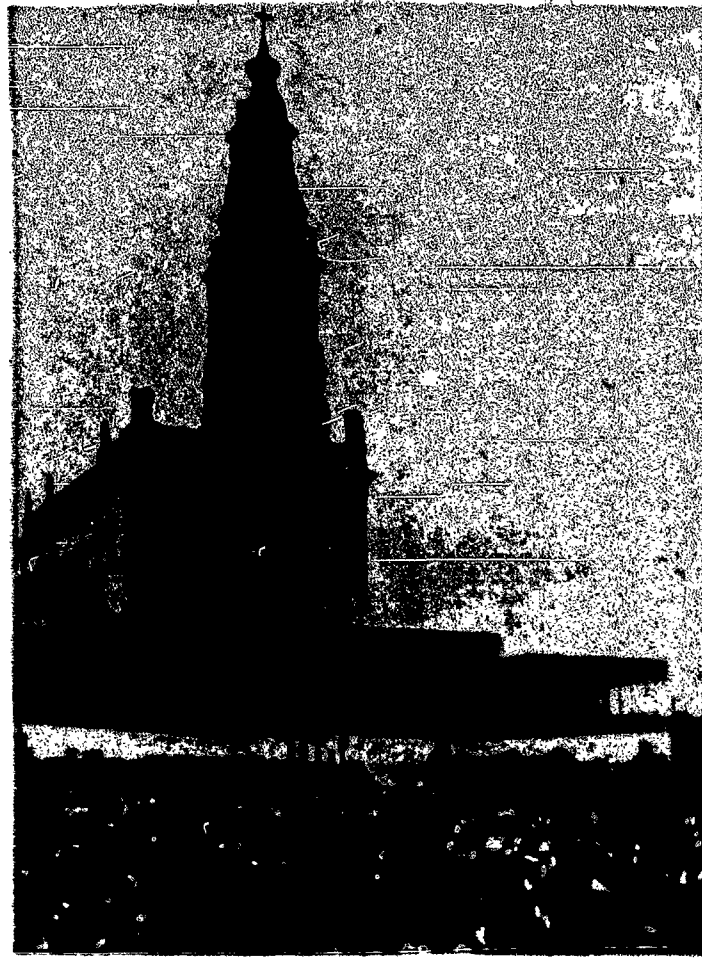
Abp. Beran Again Shifted By Regime

Rome (RNS) Archbishop Joseph Beran, who was banished by the Czechoslovak Communist government from the Prague archdiocese last March, is now under confinement at a monastery at Telc near Brno, Moravia, according to a report here. The report appeared in Veritas, which was launched early this year as the official organ of the Czechoslovak Catholic Action organization started here by refugees from Prague. It is modeled after the former Church-sponsored movement in Czechoslovakia which was ordered disbanded by the government.

Veritas said that Archbishop Beran was first confined to a monastery at Rosalov, Bohemia, and later transferred to a monastery near Nova Rise a few miles from the Austrian-Moravian border.

In each case according to Veritas, the places of confinement were changed because as soon as Archbishop Beran's presence became known crowds of local Catholics would assemble outside the monasteries to pray for him. On many occasions, the publication said the neighborhood Catholics tried to get letters and food to the archbishop.

Waldorf Head Waiter Levies Pennies On Staff To Aid Catholic Missioners

New York (NC) — Mistakenly by Conrad Hilton, owner of the Waldorf-Astoria, who contributed \$100.

Rene Black, 71, gourmet manager of all the various restaurants of the Waldorf-Astoria, is the reason. Inez Robb, INS columnist, calls him a "one-man board of directors of a wide variety of foreign missions, ranging through the Franciscan Fathers to the Trappist monks and from the Maryknoll Sisters to Father Pio's Boys Town in Perugia, Italy."

IN AN INTERVIEW with Miss Robb, Mr. Black explained how mistakes benefit the missions. "If I catch a waiter who has not read the menu, I fine him a penny. Or if one has not set the table properly, or if he spills the water, or if he drops a roll, it costs him a penny, too."

And if a waiter digs down into a pocket and comes up with a handful of change, it all goes into the mission kitty. "I cannot allow them to return change to a pocket," smiles Mr. Black. "It wouldn't be sanitary."

ON HIS DESK, Mr. Black keeps a glass pint jar, his mission bank, which fills up rapidly. Old customers are likely to empty their pockets of small change whenever they lunch or dine at the hotel. Mr. Black's rule about accepting nothing but

small change has been beaten only by Conrad Hilton, owner of the Waldorf-Astoria, who contributed \$100.

"And naturally," explained Mr. Black, "I could not argue with my employer."

Concerning his own system for contributing to the fund, Mr. Black said:

WHENEVER I shave myself, I put 25 cents in the jar, and whenever I shave my own shoes, I add another 10 cents. Or if I think a young lady's eyes are shining especially for me and my mind begins to get 21 instead of 71, I put in a dollar. At that I have myself 300, because with inflation, pencils and champagne, it must cost that much at present to take out a young lady for the evening."

Mr. Black, a native of France, became interested in foreign missions during his very early years in Jesuit schools there. As a student on traveling scholarships during summer vacations, he visited Jesuit missions in Hawaii, Africa, the Far East, South America and the United States by the time he was 18.

WAITERS AT the hotel now are as interested in the mission as Mr. Black. He reports to them regularly on where the money is sent, what the missions buy with it, and frequently reads them letters from grateful priests and nuns.

Card. Tedeschini Reported Sick On Rome Return

Rome (RNS) — Federico Cardinal Tedeschini, Archbishop of Palermo, returned here from Fatima, Portugal, where he officiated at ceremonies marking the official close of the extended Holy Year of 1951.

It was announced that the cardinal, who had complained of a sore throat while in Portugal, was ill and in need of absolute rest.

This meant that he would not be immediately available for comment on his speech at Fatima in which he stressed that Pope Pius XII had named the same "miracle of the sun" seen by the shepherd children of Fatima when the Virgin Mary made her last appearance to them in October, 1917.

Cardinal Tedeschini's speech caused a minor sensation here. The question which many people are asking is whether or not the Pope also had a vision of the Virgin Mary when he witnessed the solar phenomenon.

Leopard Caught In Jungle By Priest Goes To Zoo

Melbourne (NC) — The local zoo here has accepted as a gift a leopard caught in India by an Australian Jesuit priest who recently went to the mission fields in that country.

The zoo authorities have arranged shipment of the leopard with the priest, the Rev. Kevin Grogan, S. J., who tells the story of its capture in a letter received at the Jesuit Mission House in this city.

IT APPEARS that a village old Father Grogan had a leopard trapped many miles away. The priest immediately organized a party and they set out with their own trap to bring back the captured animal.

Monsoon rains drove them back and they set out again the following morning. They crossed the raging Sunk River in a danga, hollowed out logs, but the current swept them a quarter of a mile downstream. A ferry man, however, punted the danga, but at times could not reach the bottom.

WHEN THEY reached the trapped leopard they found the solitary guard slightly tipsy after drinking daru (the local jungle juice). The hazards of the return journey were increased by the weight of the prize. During the journey Father Grogan baptized a baby.

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
