

5 Diocesan Union Aides Picked By HNS President

Five key chairmen to direct various phases of the work of Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union were named this week by Martin Q. Moll, president.

They are: John T. Nothnagle, diocesan chairman of the Public Information Committee; John M. Hedger, diocesan chairman of External Program; Harold J. Coleman, diocesan chairman of the Daily Mass League; Edward M. Lorschneider, diocesan chairman of Internal Program; and Urban G. Kress, diocesan chairman of Membership.

These appointments, Moll stated, "are the first moves towards an integrated diocesan program aimed at assisting each deanery and parish in organization, programming and point-to-point efforts on a diocesan or diocesan level. There will be more responsible appointments as the program unfolds."

EACH COMMITTEE, it is understood, will have representation from every deanery. The committee for the Daily Mass League will attempt to encourage Holy Name Men in every parish to attend daily Mass. Service to the parishes is the theme of the projected plans.

Each committee will report to the diocesan president who will then relay their findings and recommendations to the parish presidents to apply all practical suggestions towards a successful parish Holy Name Society.

An assembly of presidents and spiritual directors will be held periodically to exchange ideas and work out plans for concerted action on projects of mutual interest. In addition, training institutes for parish and deanery officers will be scheduled to help in the development of leaders in Holy Name Work.

Confraternity Sessions In Chicago Open Nov. 7

The Diocese of Rochester will be represented at the Ninth National Congress of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine scheduled in Chicago Nov. 7 to 11, according to the Rev. Albert H. Schenck, diocesan director.

Registration from practically every state in the union is expected to reach the 10,000 mark. His Excellency Bishop Kearney is scheduled to attend the Congress from Thursday, Nov. 7 to Sunday, Nov. 11. Father Schenck will attend a session on Nov. 7.

Also attending will be the Rev. Patrick Moffatt, pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church, Rochester and Sister Anita of the Missionary Servants of the Most Blessed Trinity assigned to Holy Rosary.

A COMPREHENSIVE agenda designed to draw attention to Congress delegates upon topics that must include a treatment of problems "close to home," will include discussions on every conceivable topic from "Keeping God at the Center of Today's Home" to "Problems Confronting the Man About To Enter Society."

Chicago's Sheraton and St. Clair Hotels will be transformed into temporary educational centers. Facilities of Lewis Tavern, Quigley Evangelical Seminary and the spacious residence-hospital studios of nearby WCCO broadcasting station will be placed at the disposal of the convention.

Participating in two of the convention sessions will be Mrs. Mary Booth Lane, former Congresswoman from Connecticut and noted convert. She will be a featured speaker at the opening session discussing "The Apostle of Good Will—A Challenge to Everyone." She will also talk on Nov. 9 at the evening session on "Understanding the New Catholic Mind."

FULTON DUNSMIR, editor of Readers Digest magazine and widely known for his works on the Bible will speak on Nov. 8 on "Living the Scripture today." Final of the five-day convention will be a city-wide tribute to God and country on Armistice Day in Chicago stadium. Highlights of the tribute will be addressed by His Eminence Cardinal Stritch, host to the convention and Bishop Fulton J. Sheen, Auxiliary of New York and National Society for the Propagation of the Faith director.

8 From Diocese At Confraternity Meet In Albany

Rochester diocese had a prominent role in the Fourth National Congress of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine held in Albany, Oct. 24, 27 and 28, which the principal address on Friday was given by His Excellency Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York.

Sessions were held for the 25th anniversary of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine and for the clergy in the New York State.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney presided at the opening session of Oct. 24 and the Rev. Albert H. Schenck, diocesan director, presided at the closing session on Oct. 28. The Rev. Schenck was chairman of the session on "Teaching Religion in Public Schools."

Discussing the role of the laity in the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, Sister M. St. Mary of the Sisters of St. Joseph at the convent of St. Joseph in Rochester declared youth to be the key to the future.

"The boys and girls in our classrooms today are the future of the Church," she said, "and we must do our best to prepare them for the future."

During the 1941 sessions were Rev. Magr. William J. Brien, V.F. Dean of Elmhurst Deanery, who talked on "The Art of Illustrations in Public High School Classes" and the Rev. Patrick A. Moffatt, pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church whose topic was "Making Instruction Interesting."

The Rt. Rev. Magr. Joseph J. Brien, professor of St. Bernard's Seminary had the topic "Teaching 'Procedures' in the classroom as 'Aids for the Teacher'."

Under the heading "Common Denominators of Methods of Teaching Religion," Sister Mary Lough, M.S.M.T., of Christ the King Missionary Convent and Sister M. Madelon, M.S.M.T., of St. Mary's Convent represented the 25th and 26th grade teachers respectively.

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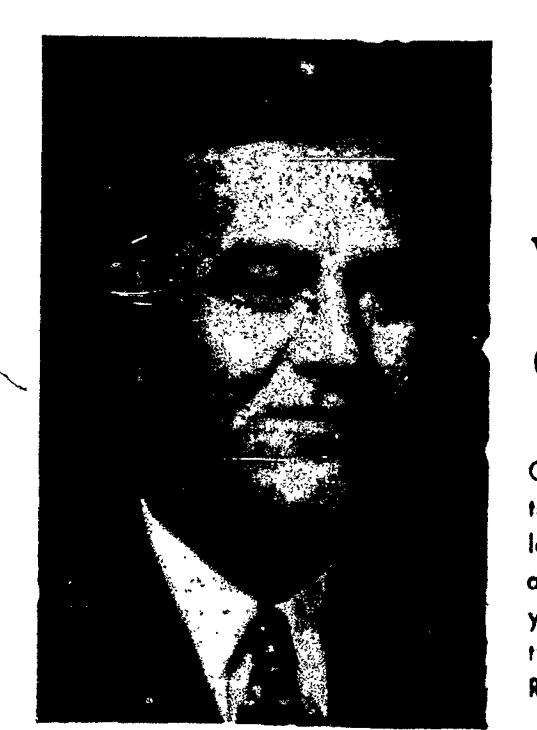
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
