Fr. Luddy Asks Nocturnal Men To Promote Daily Mass

Daily Mass and Communion as the fruit of Nocturnal Adoration was the keynote of the message given by the Rev. Francis W. Luddy, to 200 men of the Nocturnal Adoration Society last Sunday.

The Society held its Annual Sunday Evening Holy Hour in Our Lady of Lourdes Church, of which Father Luddy is pastor.

In the business meeting in the Parish Hall afterwards, election of officers took place and retiring President David Gales invited the newly elected President, George H. Siegrist, of St. Patrick's Parish to continue the meeting.

LEO F. ZELLEN, of St. Ann's Parish, was elected Vice President. Other officers re-elected are: James J. Cullen and Matthias J. Kuebel, Vice Presidents; Joseph W. Benn, Executive Secretary; James V. Taylor, Recording Secretary; Sylvester G. Engert, Treasurer; Frank S. Ton, Marshal.

Recalling the words of Our Lord in the Garden of Gethsemane, addressed to Peter, James and John, "Can you not watch one hour with me?" Father Luddy commended Nocturnal men for their affirmative response to Our Lord's question by spending one hour with Him, not just once, but every month, thus giving a public testimony of their faith in the Real Presence.

FATHER LUDDY continued: "You men who are willing to make the sacrifices which your nocturnal vigils throughout the night require, should be the best Apostles of devotion to Christ in the Eucharist."

"If the Church is to grow we must make Christ better known and loved. Christ is to be found in the Blessed Sacrament. Our faith in the Divine Presence and devotion to our Blessed Lord in the Eucharist is the first phase in our relationship with Christ in this world."

"The second step is the unflinching of ourselves with the daily renewal of His redeeming passion and death—Holy Mass, and third, frequent, if possible, daily nourishing of our souls with the Bread of Life—the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ."

The Rev. Leo C. Mooney, Spiritual Director of the Nocturnal Society, officiated at Benediction and acted as Moderator in discussions at the meeting.

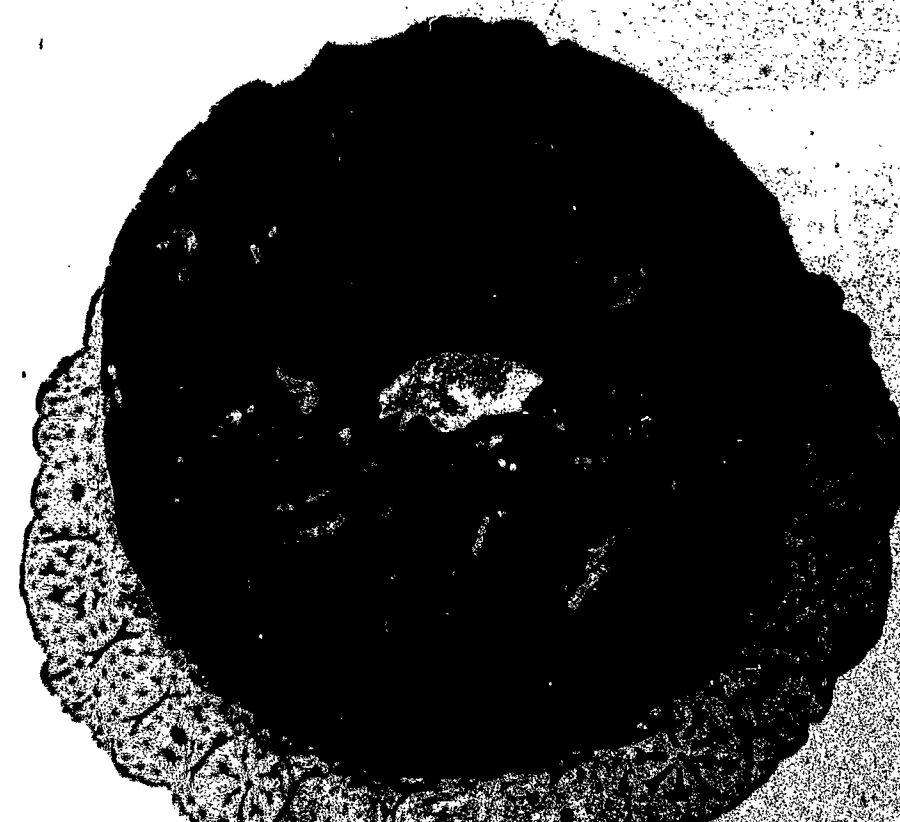
