It is the intent of this committee to make a public report of its findings at the earliest opportunity.

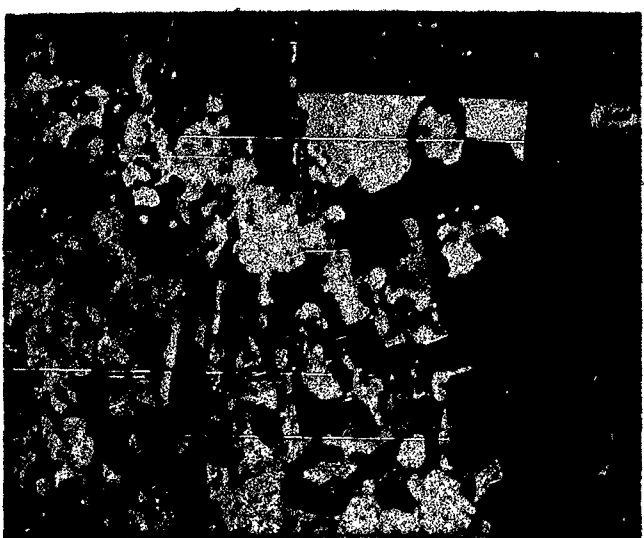

### State Department St. Jerome's Group Seeks Typists Seats New Officers

The U. S. Department of State is seeking stenographers and typists for service in Washington, D. C. and foreign countries and has recruiting representatives here to interview interested applicants at Hotel Seneca.

Jack Snyder, a State Department personnel representative is granting interviews at the hotel. He and his staff are handling interviews between the hours of 9 a. m. and 9:30 p. m. each week day until Nov. 30.

The State Department seeks persons who represent a good cross-section of the United States for its overseas posts - people who know and can talk about all parts of the country.

While knowledge of a foreign language might be helpful, it isn't necessary for the jobs in U. S. embassies, consulates and legations throughout the world. Of prime importance is the ability to take dictation at 80 words per minute and to type at 40 words per minute.

Salary for stenographic and typist positions in the foreign service starts at \$3,150 per year, plus extra allowances upon arrival at overseas posts. Posts are also available from time to time in Washington, with salaries starting at from \$2,950 to \$3,175 per year.
