VA Aide From Here In Catholic U.

Joseph J. Hauser, 40 Wyndham Road Rochester has been appointed by the Veterans Administration to take courses in clinical psychology in the Department of Psychology and Psychiatry at the Catholic University of America, Rev. Dr. John W. Stafford, head of the Department, announced in Washington.

The program which is in its fifth year, consists of four years of training, including one year of supervised internship leading to the Ph.D. in clinical psychology. A stipend is provided by the Veterans Administration to each student taking the course at Catholic University, which is one of 42 universities in the nation approved by the American Psychological Association for this training program.

St. Monica Pilgrims Top Holy Year Visits By Bus

St. Monica's Parish on a Holy Year Pilgrimage Sunday turned out and among these set a record for those using that conveyance.

The Genesee St. church group took 19 buses to carry 815 persons and these added to 2 previous buses made a total of 895 persons to set the record according to William A. Lang, vice president of the Rochester Transit Corporation.

The St. Monica group on Sunday was led by the Very Rev. Monsignor Gerald C. Lambert, pastor, who said the spontaneous response and devotion of his parishioners were most edifying.

ON THE VISITS to the four churches designated by His Excellency Bishop Kearney for gaining the Holy Year Indulgences, Monsignor Lambert was assisted by the Rev. Donald Mulcahy, the Rev. Patrick J. Grace, the Rev. Michael P. O'Brien and the Rev. John J. Tressy in leading the prayers.

On the buses between churches the Rosary was recited with each bus in charge of a leader of the Holy Name Society.

Sunday was a record day also in the Holy Year bus pilgrimage as there were 37 buses in movement that day. Besides the 19 for St. Monica's, the following were reported: Church of the Annunciation, 2 buses, 93 persons; St. Joseph's, 9 buses, 407 persons; Holy Apostles, 7 buses, 286 persons. The total making the pilgrimage by bus was 1,581 persons.

WITH ST. MONICA'S highest for the year. The following are also among the top parishes: St. Andrew's with 19 buses and 827 persons; highest for one day, third Blessed Sacrament, 19 buses, 816 persons; fourth

Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral, 20 buses and 770 persons and fifth, Holy Cross, Charlotte, 15 buses and 740 persons.

The total of persons carried by Rochester Transit buses during the Holy Year is 15,717. Joseph W. Hauser of the Rochester Transit Corporation staff is handling the arrangements.

As announced by the Chancery, the Holy Year Indulgences may be gained until Christmas Eve, 1951.
