HORIZONS ARE ever a reminder of Christopher Morley's, "Where the Blue Begins." This delightful story of Glasing, a dog, to whom the author gives all the characteristics of a human, has a special appeal to anyone, who is seeking a true horizon.

Glasing was a thoughtful creature, but he realized that something vital was missing from his existence. As he ran over the hillsides, soon after sunrise in the lifting day, he marveled at the blue on the skyline. "Where does the Blue Begin," he would ask and then turn away disheartened—because no one gave him the answer.

"Where does the Blue Begin," for us in Catholic Family Service, Glasing—after a long search—found it in his own home—the heavenly blue of a horizon—in the flame of his furnace fire. Too often, we forget the horizons, within our reach because of the blank walls, we are facing at the moment. Perhaps that is what happened to you, when you were approached by a solicitor from the Community Chest.

Horizons and ideals belong to even the most humble of God's creatures, and the Catholic Social Worker finds his or her bluest horizon, when she has helped some of His men, women and children. Whether or not we can find where "The Blue Begins" for these troubled people, who come to our Intake Desk, depends upon what you do about this Community Chest debt.

religious, and faithful salute you their leader, and pray most fervently to God that He continue to keep you in this charge for many years to come. And in their prayers of thanksgiving with you and in their supplication to God for your continued welfare and work, they are joined by the most imposing assemblage of Cardinals, Archbishops, Bishops and priests in Detroit's 250 years of Catholic life."

The ceremonies attending the consecration of the impressive Cathedral began Friday evening when Bishop Allen J. Babcock Auxiliary of Detroit, and assisting clergy prepared and venerated the relics of saints that were to be placed in the Cathedral's high altar. Priests maintaining a vigil venerated these holy mementoes of martyrs throughout the night.

At 6 o'clock Saturday morning, Bishop Babcock, who is pastor of the Cathedral, together with the priests assisting him, began a four-hour ritual of consecration that is among the most colorful ceremonies in the liturgy of the Church.

At 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning there began the procession of priests, Bishops, Archbishops and Cardinals. The procession wound its way into the Cathedral, "stripped and empty" in keeping with Canon Law, and Cardinal Mooney, accompanied by his assisting deacons and the deacon and the sub-deacon of the Mass proceeded to the high altar. There the Cardinal offered his Mass of Thanksgiving for the completion of the Cathedral and for his quarter of a century in the episcopate.

Four prelates who studied as seminarians under His Eminence Edward Cardinal Mooney, Arch-bishop of Detroit, marched in the colorful episcopal processions at ceremonies commemorating the silver jubilee of the Cardinal's consecration and the solemn dedication of the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament here.

They are: Archbishop Joseph P. Hurley, Bishop of St. Augustin and Regent of the Papal Nunciature at Belgrade; Yugo-slavia Bishop Michael J. Ready of Columbus; Bishop John F. Dearden of Pittsburgh and Bishop Floyd Beggs Auxiliary of Cleveland.

Also in the procession were four who witnessed Cardinal Mooney's consecration in Rome in 1926: Archbishop Leo Binz, Coadjutor of Dubuque; Msgr. James M. McDonough of Cleveland; Msgr. Anthony J. Dear of Toledo, O.; and the Rev. John M. Powers of Cleveland Heights, O.
