The boys were arrested by Sgt. Thomas McLaughlin and Patrolman Richard Stapleton. When questioned by these officers and Chief Joseph McDonough, the boys admitted the deeds, the police said.

The trio will be tried in children's court. Previously the police apprehended some under-teenage children who admitted knocking over stones in the Washington St. Cemetery before Halloween. They were lectured by police and their parents informed of their actions. The police have been concentrating on the St. Patrick's cemetery damage and the arrests Monday closed the case.
