

Bome -(RNS)- This photo of the "Miracle of the Revolving Sun" recorded near Fatima, Portugal, in 1917, was reproduced by Osservatore Romano, Vatican newspaper, as documentary evidence of the solar phenomenon. This photo shows the sun "revolving around itself" as it alternately danced

and came closer to the horizon. leaving its usual position in the sky for that time of day. 
