

### Thanksgiving Clothing Plea Wins Wide Response

Preliminary reports indicate generous response to the Thanksgiving Clothing Collection, according to the Rev. John T. Callahan, diocesan director. A list of parish reports will appear in subsequent issues of the Courier Journal.

TWO television shows brought the appeal to many of the Diocesan area viewers on Tuesday, Oct. 22, on the Mort Nussbaum Show, WHAM-TV with an interview of Mrs. Kenneth McDonald, and later the same day Mrs. Joseph Morin appeared on Open House with Ann Rogers and Russ Weller.

The Rev. Charles Hilbert, M.M., former China missionary, was interviewed by Pauline Gaffney over Station WHEC.

Mayor Samuel Dicker issued a proclamation calling attention to the project. Neighborhood newspapers carried the picture of the campaign poster.
