He won national reputation for his work as ranking Republican member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. In 1947-48 he served as chairman of that committee. He was one of the American delegates to the convention at San Francisco in 1945 which drafted the United Nations Charter. An ardent advocate of international cooperation, Dr. Eaton regarded this as the crowning achievement of his career.

A native of Canada, Dr. Eaton graduated from Acadia University, Nova Scotla, in 1890, and was ordained into the Baptist ministry in 1893 after graduation from Newton Theological Seminary, Boston, Mass.

He was early acclaimed as a brilliant preacher, and Baylor University in Texas conferred an honorary doctorate of divinity upon him when he was only 31 ears old. Two years later he became pastor of the fashionable




