

### Trucker On 'Last Trip' Converted On Deathbed

Fort Wayne, Ind. (NC)—A 29-year old truck driver who was making his "one last trip" before re-enlisting in the Navy, became a Catholic convert on his death bed (Dec. 5). He received the Sacraments of Baptism, Extreme Unction and Confirmation all within a few minutes.

DONALD W. BROWN, of Indianapolis, was making his last trip as a driver for the Interstate Motor Freight Co. after a ten-year record without a serious accident. He was driving through Fort Wayne when his semi-trailer truck crashed into concrete supports of the Wabash Railroad's elevated tracks. The impact ruptured one of the saddle gasoline tanks and the truck caught fire.

He suffered third degree burns and was admitted to St. Joseph's

Hospital here. At the hospital, Mr. Brown, who said he had no religious affiliations, asked to be baptized in the Catholic Faith.

THE REV. LOUIS Postkoetter, hospital chaplain, administered the Sacraments of Baptism and Extreme Unction. Several minutes later Bishop Leo A. Pursey, Auxiliary of Fort Wayne, administered the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Mr. Brown lapsed into unconsciousness shortly after receiving the Sacraments and died without regaining consciousness.

### Educator Impressed At Salzburg Mass

Alexandria, Va. (NC)—Telling of the deep impression left with him after witnessing a Solemn Mass before 40,000 Austrians at Salzburg, President H. C. Byrd of the University of Maryland said America would have something more worthwhile to sell abroad if it built up spiritual values similar to this demonstration. He spoke before a gathering of members of seven civic clubs.

### TV Code Of Practices Take Effect In March

Washington—(NC)—A code of practices for television, which "establishes tenets for good programming and advertising," will go into effect next March 1, the National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters has announced here.

The code, promulgated by the NARTB, provides for appointment of a five-member national review board.

ALL OF THE Nation's television stations and networks, whether or not they are members of the NARTB, are eligible to subscribe to the code. Currently 78 stations and two networks belong to NARTB. In all there are 108 TV stations and four networks in the U. S.

Subscribers will be provided with a seal, which can be shown on television screens. This seal can be withdrawn from the subscriber if the station does not abide by the code.

SPECIAL ADDENDA to the code list words and phrases considered unsuitable for use on television.

Robert D. Swezey of New Orleans, who directed the committee which drafted the original code, said the promulgated measure reflects the determination of TV broadcasters, to "represent and manage a 'family medium'."
