Ex-Buffalo Man Named In NCCM Television Plan

Dean McCarthy who has done radio and newspaper work in Buffalo will have an important role in an extensive television program envisioned by the National Council of Catholic Men. McCarthy has been named as assistant television program manager of the NCCM according to Martin H. Work, NCCM executive secretary.

McCarthy formerly was assistant to the director of the N. C. W. C. Youth Department. A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the Catholic University of America, Mr. McCarthy, while in the military service, wrote and produced several shows which toured the military installations in Germany, Italy and Australia.

THE NCCM now is engaged in the program of "Frontiers of Faith," the National Broadcasting Company's religious television feature, and contemplates an expanded program of TV operations.

Included in the program, it was stated, will be an extensive study of the possibilities of establishing a television moral rating plan, creation of a film information center to provide information on all suitable Catholic films and at the same time investigate the possibilities of Catholic film productions; formation of a script service to diocesan television directors to enable local plans to work closely with the TV networks in an effort to secure more time for national Catholic television programs. He said that the council hoped within a year to have crystallized the activities it has planned.
