THE FRANCISCAN Order is rich in benefits not the least of which is that of the privileged altar which is explained by Father Albert Nimeth as follows:

A very consoling benefit obtained by a member who dies in good standing is that of the "privileged altar." A privileged altar is one to which is attached the special favor that when a priest offers Mass at it for a soul in purgatory a plenary indulgence is offered for that soul.

"When a soul gains a plenary indulgence it stands level with the justice of God. Regardless of what its past life may have been, if it actually gains the plenary indulgence, the whole debt is wiped out."

"Having faith in the Church's right to grant a plenary indulgence a layman will appreciate knowing that every time and everywhere that a Mass is offered for a deceased member of the Third Order the altar is privileged."

"Neither a priest offering the Mass nor a layman offering the stipend need be aware of this fact. It is a benefit. The privileged altar is a tangible benefit derived from membership in the Third Order."
