Geneva — A broken arm may have taken John A. Murray out of circulation for a while, but it didn't keep him away from his paint box.

A water color of St. Stephen's church, now on exhibit in Fairfax Bros. store on Castle St., was done while Mr. Murray was disabled by a broken left arm from July 6 to Nov. 2.

MR. MURRAY lives at 261 William St. He says he's been painting "ever since I can remember."

He has done water colors, quite a few oils including still life, portrait work and landscapes. He isn't too keen about portrait work but as he says, "Anything that happens to strike my fancy, I take a crack at."

The water color of St. Stephen's church was brought to Fairfax Bros. for framing. Because of its strong local interest it was placed on display. It is a sharp and forceful bit of work with brilliant color.

"I HAD TIME on my hands," said Mr. Murray, referring to his enforced rest. "So I decided to use my right arm for painting. It's been a hobby of mine ever since I can remember."

Mr. Murray was with the 17th Airborne division in World War II in the European theatre. Upon his return, he went to Interlaken where he operated a foundry for about five years. He is now conducting his own sign works in Geneva.
