### Charity Nun-Twins Marking Jubilee Had Sister Here

Twin sisters of the late Sister Martha who had devoted nearly 50 years to care of the sick at St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester, marked their golden jubilee as Sisters of Charity at Seton Institute, Baltimore.

Solemn Mass for the jubilarians, Sister Barbara and Sister Margaret Nealen, twins, was offered by the Rev. Peter Goldbach, C.M., Seton Institute chaplain.

IT WAS REPORTED to be the first time in the history of the Daughters of Charity that twin sisters celebrated their Golden Jubilee as Sisters of Charity.

Sister Barbara has spent her entire religious life as the pharmacist of Seton Institute. Sister Margaret served for several years as a nurse at Providence

Hospital, Buffalo, before returning to Seton in a smaller capacity.

Sisters Barbara and Margaret were members of a large family at Nicholson, Pa., when they entered the Order. Two other members of the family became Vincentians, Sister Martha who died in 1949 and Brother Vincent, C.M., stationed at Niagara University. Four other sisters and five brothers of the Nealen family are still living. Three sisters and one brother are dead.

THE SISTERS received a personal message from His Excellency Archbishop Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate, who also imparted the Holy Father's blessing. Messages of congratulation came from Archbishop Dennis Stittincher of St. Vincent's Archdiocese, Latrobe, Pa., cousin of the jubilarians; Mother Marie Antoinette Blanche, Superior of the Daughters of Charity, Paris; the Very Rev. William M. Slattery, C.M., Superior General of the Vincentian Fathers and the Daughters of Charity; the Very Rev. Francis J. Dodd, C.M., director of the Daughters of Charity of the Eastern Province, and the Rev. Joseph Nealen, S.J., Gonzaga

University, Spokane, Wash., a nephew of the Sisters.

Sister Isabel, Visitatrix of the Eastern Province who attended the ceremonies, presented greetings from the Order.
