Calling to the slogan, "You Need Music—Music Needs You," hundreds of volunteer workers from Rochester and 20 surrounding communities will seek a goal of \$126,000 in the 24th annual Civic Music Association Fund Drive which opens next week. The campaign, under the chairmanship of Raymond W. Albright, will run from February 15 to 25. The Rochester Civic Music Association underwrites the expenses of a broad program of cultural and educational activities in Rochester. It supports the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, Erie-Lansford, conductor, which gives 14 concerts and goes on three tours each season, and the Civic Orchestra which presents 22 Sunday evening "Pop" concerts. Membership in the Association costs \$7.50, but subscriptions of any other amount—larger or smaller—are accepted. Members receive free admission to six special Membership Night concerts, a weekly copy of the Civic Music News and priority in purchasing tickets to many outstanding musical events in Eastman Theatre.

Madrid—(RNS)—Father Pedro Cantero, religion editor of Ya, Madrid daily, was named Bishop of Barbastro, in the province of Huesca, by Pope Pius XII. It was announced here.
