"A Scout is reverent." This part of the Scout oath was stressed by the Rev. George M. Kalb, pastor of Holy Trinity Church, Webster, in a sermon last Sunday to approximately 80 scouts from Rochester, Webster and Union Hill.

THIS WAS one of the many observances throughout the diocese of Boy Scout Sunday, chief of which was the Mass at St. John the Evangelist Church, Rochester where 14 troops gathered. Martin Q. Moll, addressed the boys at the breakfast following.

The scouts at Webster including Cub, Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts, were among campers at Camp Cutler in Webster over the weekend. They received Holy Communion in a body at the 8:30 a.m. Mass and were guests of the parish Holy Name Society at a breakfast in the school hall.

The Rochester boys were from St. Andrew's parish, Richard Wawzyniak and Bernard Stein of Troop 103, Webster, served the Mass in uniform.

Charles Fordham, Camp Cutler ranger and principal breakfast speaker, told of the origin of Scouting 42 years ago, outlined the conduct of Camp Cutler, and stressed the need of adult volunteer leadership in the Scout movement. Guests at the breakfast were welcomed by Webster Police Chief James O. Stein, president of the parish Holy Name Society.

New Capuchin Friary Also In New Province

Established in the Diocese of Rochester, near Interlaken, a new Friary of the Order of Friars Minor Capuchin or Capuchins is now in the newly formed Province of St. Mary of the Capuchin Order.

This information was made public today by the Rev. Bede Scully, O.F.M. Cap, superior of St. Fidelis Friary at "Shadow Lawn," near Interlaken, N. Y.

The order has been established in this diocese with the approbation of His Excellency Bishop Kearney.

The new friary is on the former Westinghouse property at Sheldrak purchased from Mr. and Mrs. John J. Quinn of Truemanburg by the Capuchin Fathers in July 1951.

AMONG THE Capuchin Fathers in the new province is the Rev. Seraphim Winterroth, O.F.M. Cap, whose home is in Rochester and who is a brother of the Rev. Theodore J. Winterroth, pastor of St. John the Baptist Church, Elmira.

The province divided from the Capuchin Province of St. Joseph on Feb. 2, 1952, includes these friaries of the New York Archdiocese: Our Lady of Sorrows, St. John, Our Lady Queen of Angels, Sacred Heart and Mary Immaculate; St. Michael's of Brooklyn and St. Fidelis of Rochester diocese. In addition the province supports the missions of Guam and the Ryukyu Islands.

New Superiors appointed by the order's Minister General in Rome are: Father Adrian, provincial with his council called Fathers Definitors include Fathers Seraphim, Anselm, Lambert and James. The Custodes Generales are: Fathers Paschal and Bertrand.

Membership of the Province comprises: 113 priests, 2 Bishops, 37 clerics, 6 novice clerics.

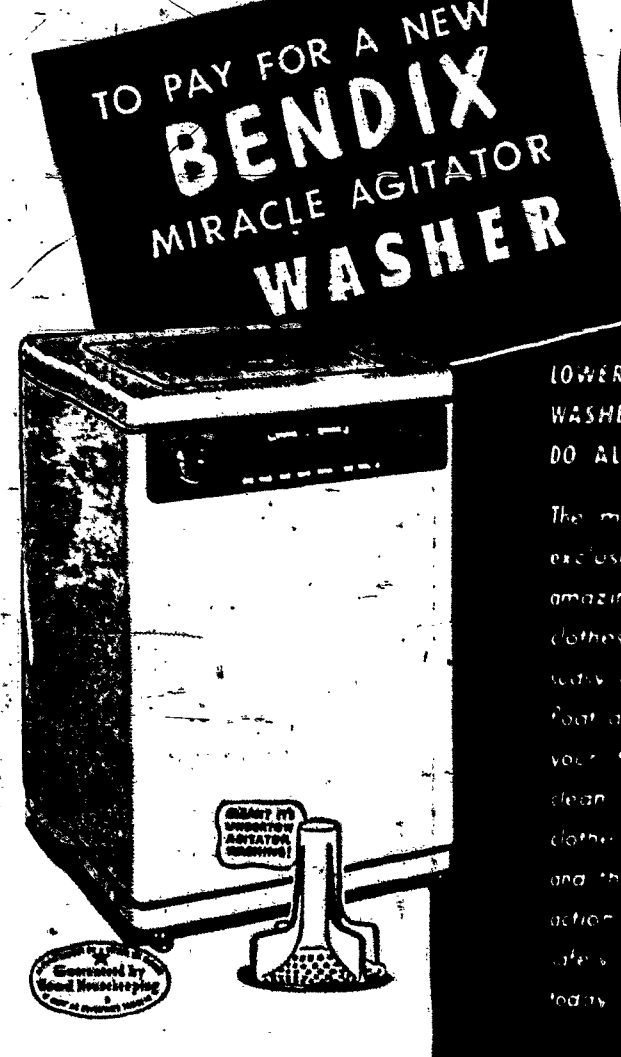

Two of these girls, Sister Mary Martina, the former Miss Eleanor Greene and Sister Mary John Francis, the former Miss Virginia Cameron received the white veil of a novice. Sister Mary Martina is the first Negro postulant in the order.

A graduate of Nazareth Academy, Sister Mary Theophane, formerly Miss Mary Hunter, received the Rosary which marked the end of the canonical or first year of the novitiate.

The fourth Sister from the Rochester diocese, Sister Mary Juan, formerly Miss Virginia Delaney of Auburn, also received the Rosary.

Sister Mary Martina, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orlando J. Greene of Corpus Christi Parish, Rochester, is a graduate of Our Lady of Mercy High School, class of 1951.

Sister Mary John Francis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Moran of St. James Parish, Irondequoit, is also a graduate of Our Lady of Mercy High in the 1951 class.

That plans and alterations are underway to handle the entire Aquinas Institute student body including 500 freshmen as the main school on Dewey Ave. in September was announced today by the Very Rev. Eugene A. Cullinane, C.S.B., principal.

Father Cullinane in an exclusive release to the Catholic Courier Journal said:

"After careful study of the student population problem brought about by the recent decision of the Board of Education to reopen No. 40 School, we have discovered that we can accommodate at Aquinas a freshman class of 500 students without in any way restricting the enrollment of Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors.

"Although the eighth grade population of Rochester parochial and public schools is increasing, Aquinas can meet the enrollment demands for the immediate present.

"Certain minor alterations will have to be made to accommodate next year's student body, so that all available space will be utilized to capacity throughout the school day. Plans for these alterations are now completed and work will begin as soon as school closes in June.

"The return to a single-unit school will be welcomed, it is felt, by students, parents and faculty alike. Aquinas itself is much more accessible than the Lagrange Avenue Annex.

"Freshmen will now find it more convenient to remain after school for participation in intermural athletics and other student activities. The regular bus service on Dewey Avenue will make it possible for students who remain after school to arrive home earlier for the evening meal. This development is certain to be welcomed by parents."
