The invocation and benediction were given by Father Hogan and Norman Murray served as "castmaster."

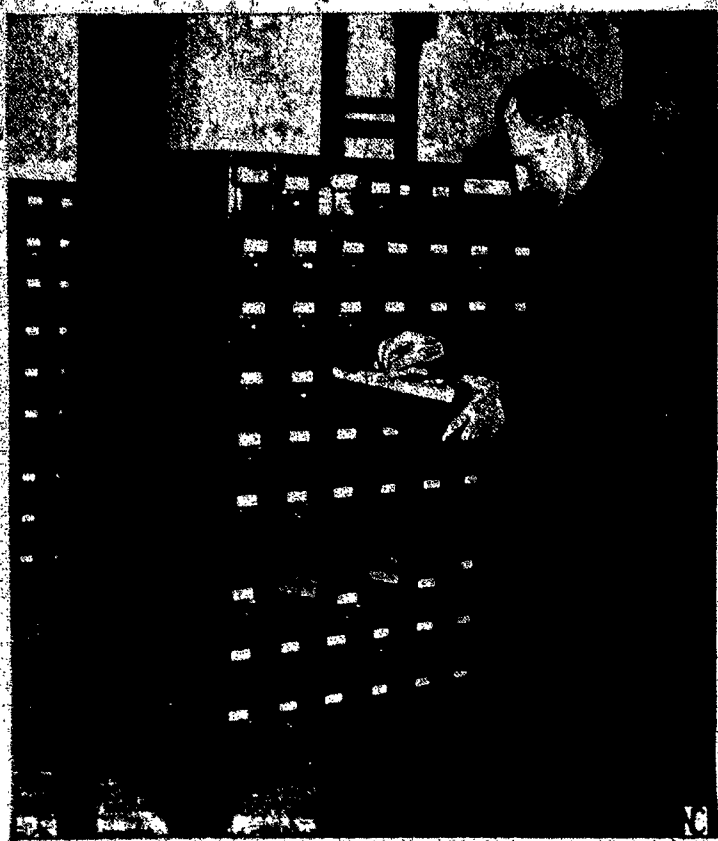
Mrs. Edwin Kerwan headed the committee of women of the parish who served the breakfast.

Loving flowers as we do, we don't quite agree with the above. We cannot think of those first days, just after a loved one has gone home to God, without the comfort of some of his own flowers.

And, during the past two decades, Catholics and many non-Catholics have taken advantage of the golden spiritual bouquets, the Masses for the one we loved so much. But sometimes you know there is even an absorption point in both of these expressions of sympathy—and some of those who have been blessed with legions of friends, might agree with Mrs. D's family.

THEN, TOO, we just had a surprising demonstration of the special appeal of planned Memorials and their responsive tug on the purse strings. Russians Control Polish Orthodox

London — (RNS) — A final step has been taken by the Russian Orthodox Church in its program to bring the Orthodox Church in Poland under its control, the Vatican Radio said.

The station reported that Patriarch Alexei of Moscow, supreme head of the Russian Church, had named Metropolitan Makarius of Lwow as Patriarch of the Polish Church.

"Makarius," the Vatican Radio said, "is a trusted man of the Kremlin puppet Alexei. It was Makarius who, in 1946 and 1947 liquidated the Uniate Churches of Ruthenia and the Ukraine. Dignitaries and priests of the Uniate Churches were either murdered or deported and the Catholic churches were taken over by the schismatic priests of Makarius."

Aquinas Main Building To House Entire Student Body

That plans and alterations are underway to handle the entire Aquinas Institute student body including 500 freshmen as the main school on Dewey Ave. in September was announced today by the Very Rev. Eugene A. Cullinane, C.S.B., principal.

Father Cullinane in an exclusive release to the Catholic Courier Journal said:

"After careful study of the student population problem brought about by the recent decision of the Board of Education to reopen No. 40 School, we have discovered that we can accommodate at Aquinas a freshman class of 500 students without in any way restricting the enrollment of Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors.

"Although the eighth grade population of Rochester parochial and public schools is increasing, Aquinas can meet the enrollment demands for the immediate present.

"Certain minor alterations will have to be made to accommodate next year's student body, so that all available space will be utilized to capacity throughout the school day. Plans for these alterations are now completed and work will begin as soon as school closes in June.

LeMoine Guild To Hear Father Lord

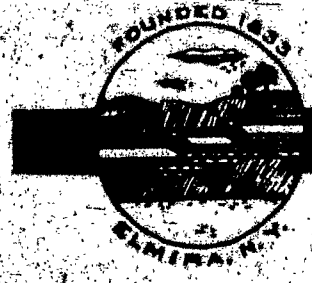
