

Two New Health Clinics Set At St. James Hospital

Hornell Orthopedic and heart clinics will be inaugurated at St. James Mercy Hospital, here, as soon as all arrangements can be made. It was announced at the hospital today.

The orthopedic clinic will be headed by Dr. M. Melvin Clark of Rochester, and the heart clinic by Dr. James Fullam of Hornell. Both physicians accepted the positions yesterday.

The orthopedic clinic will be established for those desiring consultation and possible treatment upon the recommendation of their family physician. This service will not be free and patients are expected to pay a reasonable fee for consultations or treatments.

THE HEART clinic will be set up as a diagnostic and consultative unit. Patients who attend the clinic would be referred by their physicians for assistance in diagnosis.

This clinic is a program resulting from money collected in a Hornell Heart Fund campaign. The original diagnosis program will be expanded. The medical staff said, a total of \$225 has been collected to date.

The clinical condition of the patient will be evaluated for the sake of the patient and family physicians in order to solve a more accurate diagnosis. This will be done, especially with reference to rehabilitation.

Those who are able to pay for clinical attention in the heart unit will do so, while others will be cared for free. All must be referred to the clinic by their family physician.

Dr. Fullam has had special training for this field, the medical staff said.

Both clinics will open as soon as room and equipment arrangements are completed. X-ray machines will be installed.

London—(NC)—The Catholic population in Scotland is listed in the new Scots Catholic Directory at 748,463, an increase of 3,338 over last year. Catholics account for one-seventh of the total population of Scotland.

In England and Wales the Catholic population is 2,827,700, for a total of 3,576,163 in Great Britain a ratio of one Catholic to 14 non-Catholics. The Shetland Islands, most northern part of Britain in the Aberdeen Diocese, have the fewest Catholics of any area — only six.
