A special committee of Bishops drew up the regulations in the nature of suggestions, leaving the decision as to whether they would be adopted in a particular See to the discretion of the respective Ordinary.  
An interesting sidelight on the widespread adoption is that a number of Canadian Ordinaries have drawn heavily on these recommended regulations in outlining Lenten rules for their areas.

**Paris Prelates Score Immoral Films' Effect**

Paris — (NC) — Every Sunday large posters are placed at the doors of most French churches telling Catholics how the movies to be shown during the week at nearby theaters have been rated by the Catholic Critics Committee, French counterpart of the Legion of Decency.

TWO PRELATES have recently called attention to these ratings and stressed their importance. Archbishop Maurice Feltin of Paris stated that Catholics are obliged in conscience to consult the ratings and to avoid immoral films. His Eminence Jules Cardinal Sallage, Archbishop of Toulouse, wrote in a pastoral:

"A film may be a work of art, of science, of morality, it may be a work of lies, ugliness and immorality. But its influence cannot be denied. It may be hidden, it may be profound. The images it presents are not lost, they are recorded, quickly fled away in the remote parts of the mind from which, at the least stimulus, the least suggestion, they are called forth and restored to life.

"It is, perhaps less seeing the films themselves than their effect on our minds that is dangerous, that leads to unworthy and prolonged dreams. There are beauty, truth and morality. There are films which foster our nobler instincts, which arouse our appreciation of the human and the divine. They cannot be put on the same plane: the former are harmful and corrosive; the latter useful and stimulating to beneficial thoughts and emotions."

**Markets, Laundromat Get Catholic Booklet Racks**

Arcadia, Calif. — (NC) — Backs with free Catholic literature have been placed in two supermarkets and a laundromat here by the Legion of Mary of Holy Angels parish. Housewives often take home booklets on Christian marriage, the moral law and immortality of the soul along with their groceries on the family wash.  
This "household apostolate" was begun last April. Since then more than 2,000 pieces of literature have been taken from the racks.  
Cost of keeping up a stock of literature is high, and some persons have tried to sabotage the project by regularly emptying the racks, which are plainly marked "Please Take One."

**Canadian Radio Quiz Show Cited As TV 'Natural'**

Montreal — (NC) — A radio quiz program in which six Catholic school children throw unrhymed questions at a priest has just completed its 400th broadcast on a Southern Ontario network and is being boosted as "a natural" for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation television service.  
The half-hour program emanates from London, Ont. and is carried to stations in Windsor, Hamilton and Toronto. It is within range of hundreds of thousands of homes in Southern Ontario, Michigan and New York.  
Each program of the "School of Christ" starts with one or two of the children reading passages from the Bible pertaining to the topic of the day. Then the questions fly, and the Rev. W. T. Flannery has a busy time of it.  
The children taking part are selected each year from about 40 recommended by teachers from grades six or seven in the Separate (Catholic) Schools. From that number three boys and three girls are chosen. They are bright, eager to learn, self-confident and have good radio voices.  
Two girls' choirs alternate with the program. The junior choir of 50 voices is chosen from the city's elementary schools. The senior choir of 40 voices was described by a Windsor radio official as "the best consistently among the station's programs."

**'Singing Blade' Set In Eastman Concert**

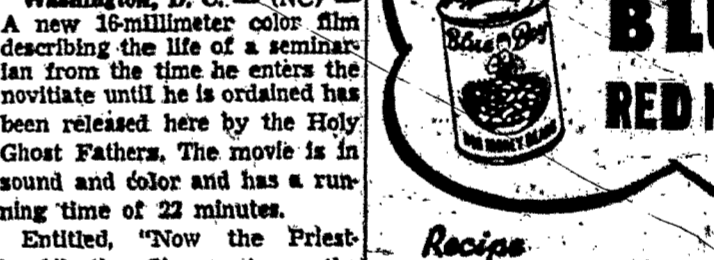
