**Young People's
 Mission Lists
 'Giant' Priest**

A giant in stature, a giant in weight and a giant in experience is said to describe the priest selected by the Very Rev. John Kehoe, S.J., Provincial of New York City to conduct a young people's mission at St. Peter & Paul's Church, Rochester, and sponsored by the Rochester Sodality Union.

The priest is the Rev. E. Paul Amy, S.J., 67 1/2 ft. tall, 250 lbs., with eleven years of experience in giving missions and retreats to high school and college students throughout the East and middle West.

FATHER AMY was born in Brooklyn and attended the Mount Holyoke in Foughkepple. He received his seminary training in Woodstock, Md. and took advanced studies in England.

He has taught High Schools in Philadelphia and New York City. He has given retreats and missions in Missouri, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Washington D.C., New Jersey, Connecticut and all parts of New York State.

The mission, conducted by Father Amy will be limited to teenagers and young people, both Catholic and non-Catholic. It will begin on Sunday evening, March 30th at 7:45 p.m. at St. Peter and Paul's Church on West Main St.

SERVICES consisting of rosary, sermon and Benediction will be held each evening at this time throughout the week. The morning services, consisting of Mass and sermon will begin at 8:45 a.m.

Those young people from outside the parish who receive Holy Communion will be able to obtain breakfast in the school hall following the Mass, and thus be able to be on time for school.

Young people's missions have been gaining in popularity throughout the country. Encouraged by the Sodality throughout the city, it is expected that a large number of young Rochesterians will make the mission, especially those from the West side. The pastors on the city's west side have given enthusiastic support to the Sodality sponsored project.

State legislators are controlled by the party whip or by the party boss.

He declared that the great remedy is the restoration of religious education to the schools of America, but the burden of this step rests upon Protestant America taking issue with the forces of secularism.

Father Mahoney declared while Catholics ever stand ready to cooperate in arriving at an adjustment it must be said that the success or failure of returning religion to American schools depends on its fair consideration by Protestants, for Protestants are in the majority.

BY THE SINCERE and right-thinking Protestants are to return religion to the schools they must be prepared to battle first with the minority group of Protestants who place blind prejudice before the welfare of the country and the moral good of its children. Such a minority group is the Protestants and Other Americans United.

Secondly they must be prepared to take issue with the forces of entrenched secularism that exert such an unwarranted influence in the control and direction of public school policy. Such forces are represented by the powerful National Education Association that has continually declared its opposition to tax monies being appropriated for education that is religious.

Recently this organization extended even further its policy of opposition when it stated in the February, 1951 issue of the National Education Association "One . . . may properly question the wisdom in our democracy of segregating several million young citizens on the basis of religion."

"Admittedly, there are difficulties to be overcome in solving the question of religion and education," Fr. Mahoney concluded, "but nothing is to be gained by hating defiance."

"A just solution would enable the enlightened educators of the twentieth century to restore to the public schools the core of religion torn out by the misguided zealots of the nineteenth century."

It would enable all the educational forces of America to labor mightily together for the advancement of our true American way of life.

Atty. John D. Frawley introduced the speaker and acted as moderator. A question and answer period followed the talk.

**Saginaw Approves
 Catholic Monument**

Saginaw, Mich. (RNS) — Saginaw's city councilmen have approved a proposal to erect in a public park here a monument commemorating the celebration of the first Roman Catholic Mass in this area.

A request for permission to erect the monument was recently submitted to the councilmen by Bishop Stephen S. Woznicki of Saginaw. The proposal brought a protest from the Saginaw Ministerial Association.

The councilman acted favorably on a special committee recommendation that a 4 by 8 foot boulder with suitable inscription be erected on Ojibway Island on a site approved by City Manager Charles A. Miller.

**Organists Awaiting
 Concert On Hammond**

Several hundred organists, pianists, and other interested persons from throughout southern New York and northern Pennsylvania already have enrolled for the free public seminar on Hammond Organ conducted by Pastor Sluipa, celebrated organist at the Park Church, Elmira, Wednesday, March 12, at 8:15 p.m. However, M. Doyle Marks & Son, the sponsors, explain everyone interested in organ and organ music will be welcome, without any prior arrangement.

Pastor Sluipa, an organist since the age of 15 and a protégé of the distinguished Marcel Dupre of Paris, has appeared in recital in all parts of this country and in South America and as soloist with symphony orchestras.

During the last 17 years, Mr. Sluipa has been playing the Hammond Organ almost exclusively, explaining that the Hammond provides for churches and other places lacking adequate pipe organs the perfect solution to their problem and, at the same time, provides the organist with a materially increased number of places where he can play.

**Diocesan Paper's News
 More Than Three Halves**

Catholic weekly newspaper in Cleveland publishes over a third more Catholic news stories than the three Cleveland secular dailies combined, and several more than twice as much space to such stories as do all three of its secular counterparts.

This disclosure of the Catholic newspaper's importance in providing news not available in the secular press is incorporated in a monitor's report at Marquette University here.

Miss Donna Ford, a graduate student in Journalism, made a study in Cleveland, by the Catholic University, of the Cleveland Diocesan weekly, and the three Cleveland secular dailies — the Plain Dealer, Press and News.

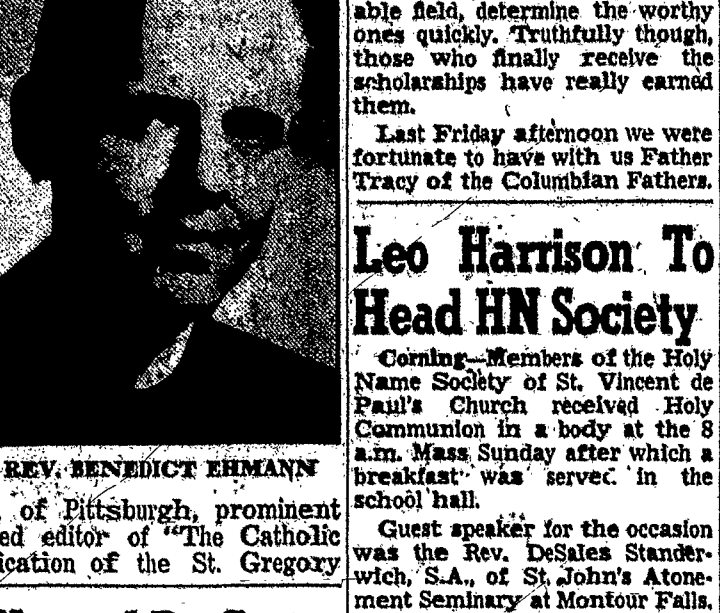

**'Choirmaster' Editor Named
 To Succeed Father Ehmann**



Named By State

The Rev. Richard Ginder, of Pittsburgh, prominent priest-journalist has been named editor of "The Catholic Choirmaster," the official publication of the St. Gregory Society of America succeeding the Rev. Benedict Ehmann, priest of the Rochester Diocese.

Father Ehmann, pastor of St. Mary's of the Lake Church, Watkins Glen and noted musician, will continue as consulting editor of the publication and has been secretary of the St. Gregory Society for more than 10 years.

THE NEW EDITOR is a recognized church musician and composer and has the distinction of being editor or associate editor of four Catholic publications. His appointment was announced by the Rev. Dr. John C. Selner, S.S., president of the St. Gregory Society. One of the former members of the Society was the late Rev. John M. Pettey of St. Bernard's Seminary faculty here.

Father Ginder is also editor of the magazine, "The Priest," and an associate editor of "The Family Digest" and "Our Sunday Visitor," all of which are published at Huntington, Ind.

HOLDER OF A Fellowship in the American Guild of Organists, Father Ginder has meanwhile been made a member of the executive board of the St. Gregory Society, Father Selner said.

Founded in 1913, the St. Gregory Society of America is devoted to the promotion of better church music. Among its patrons are their Eminences, Edward Cardinal Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit, and Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York. The society is perhaps best known for its publication of a "White List," which catalogues music suitable for use in Catholic worship.

Officials of the Catholic order, which has its headquarters here, said the school would be built near the site of the Nagasaki Cathedral which was destroyed by the bomb. The school will have facilities for some 600 pupils.
