Venezuela Student Finds Americans Always Hurrying

By WALT ROLESNIK "Nazareth College is just a bit livelier and a bit happier since Lucrecia arrived," said Mary Deane, president of the freshman class at the college, this week. "Since she arrived in January, both she and the girls with whom she lives have learned a great deal."

Miss Deane was referring to her roommate, Lucrecia Angulo, also a Nazareth College freshman. Lucrecia was born in 1932 in Maracaibo, Venezuela, where her father is a government employee. Before coming to the United States, she worked as a secretary for the Shell Caribbean Petroleum Co. in Venezuela. Although she had studied English in high school, her knowledge of the language was not enough to permit her to handle the large English correspondence required in her job. Consequently, she was sent to the United States to learn the language.

THROUGH A FRIEND she heard of Nazareth College and applied for admission. Now, with Sister St. Catherine as a special tutor, she is learning English rapidly. But some of the college slang is still confusing. Lucrecia observes that Americans always seem to be in a hurry, but she finds that they have time to be friendly. She says that Americans of college age have more freedom and more money to spend than their Venezuelan counterparts. In her country, Lucrecia points out, dates are chaperoned until the couple becomes engaged, and dates are not so extravagant.

DORMITORY LIFE for her and her fellow students is a cooperative affair. Lucrecia teaches them the rumba in return for Charleston lessons. She gives expert help in Spanish in return for explanations of English idioms. She is fast learning American sports, while her friends learn

about Venezuelan customs or her beloved Maracaibo Lake, over which, she says, there is perpetual lightning in the sky, reflected in the waters. Lucrecia has seen some of the outstanding landmarks in the United States, and is most impressed by the skyscrapers of New York City and Niagara Falls. One of her first observations upon arriving in Rochester was the difference between the New York City and upstate accents. At least one man accepts Hollywood's word for it that "Movies are better than ever." As a matter of fact many people seem to think that the better ones are much better and that, even though these do not show up too often, they make a poor substitute of T.V. when they do.

Pictures like Quo Vadis, Decision Before Dawn, and even that trite musical I'll See You In My Dreams, provoke more public comment as I work my way through the Middle West to the Eastern Seaboard, than low key dramas of the "Streetcar" type.

After I'd shown these "cut-outs" and related a little about McCarey's story, up gets this man. "It's clear to me," he said, "that movies are better than ever, because the Hollywood people are now throwing out better stuff than they used to sell us at advanced prices!"

I assured the man that Leo McCarey had a lot of better stuff left in My Son John than he'd cut out but that plenty of the Hollywood people besides McCarey would be interested in his opinion.
