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Men Must 'Return To God' Priest Tells Geneva DCCW

Geneva — Men need to "return to God" for without Him "one can accomplish nothing," the Rev. Orrin Feller of Moravia told 66 members of Geneva Deanery, National Council of Catholic Women, Saturday.

It was the first Saturday luncheon of the Deanery at Hotel Seneca.

Calling this "the age of fear," Father Feller attributed much of it to the intellectual processes of the last 150 years, including scientific dogmas, communism, secularism, which he said "tend to draw the soul away from God."

But this age is also called by the spiritually-minded as "the age of Mary." Father Feller drew a comparison between these ages. He dwelt also on the apparitions of the Blessed Mother at various times and the famous shrines which have been erected in her honor.

MRS. J. HOWARD GRODEN was general chairman of the luncheon. Mrs. Charles LaNasa arranged the beautiful shrine of Our Lady of Fatima which was a highlight of the luncheon.

The firms are Langie Fuel Service Inc., 330 Main St. East and H. H. Babcock and Co., 8 Exchange St.

The R. G. & E. will continue to manufacture coke for a time at least. Coke is a by-product of gas manufacture and is a result of the cooking of bituminous coal in huge ovens.

New methods in producing gas have resulted in reduction of amount of coke available for local retail markets. The fuel companies were selected so they can take care of customers when R. G. & E. coke is no longer available, a company spokesman said.

Budenz Urges Prayers To Mary On Red Danger

Niagara University, N. Y. — "The American nation does not understand the nature of the foe it faces, according to Louis F. Budenz, former communist party leader, who spoke here before an overflow audience. (Sunday, March 30 — Niagara University student center).

Budenz, former editor of the communist "Daily Worker," at the time of the communist party, its members and aims are bitterly assailed those who have betrayed their country to serve under the banner of Josef Stalin and other Russian overlords.

"THE GRAVE DANGER now facing the very existence of the United States has never been more challenging, and," he added, "it can only be overcome by an increased devotion to Mary."

In his talk, Mr. Budenz named many persons, prominent and otherwise, who were members of communist front organizations and said that Harvard and Columbia universities were loaded with communists and their sympathizers.

Budenz confessed that being an ex-communist was a trying and difficult task and explained how his name and the names of other witnesses against the party had been smeared. "If we are to continue to get people to testify against the communists, the American people must defend those who serve as witnesses against the conspiracy," he said.

In his conclusion, Budenz advised the American people to continue to pray for peace. "A crusade for peace through prayer," he said, "will strike at the roots of the communist evil and will bring about a period of peace and solitude throughout the world."

"I am sure," he added, "that our youthful America will be able to rise to this emergency as we have done in the past, if we return to God and work against our arch-enemies."

Research On Ionized Air To Continue At St. Bona U

St. Bonaventure, N. Y. — Success of a research project carried out at St. Bonaventure University to test the effects of concentrated ionized air on certain body functions has resulted in an extension of the experiments, Very Rev. Juvenal Lalor, O.F.M., University president, announced today.

Sponsored by the West Electric Heater Company of San Francisco, the two-year-old undertaking is being conducted by Prof. John L. Worden and a staff of research workers in the University's Department of Biology. Father Juvenal said "Bonaventure is one of six universities and medical centers carrying on research for Wesix."

IN EXPLAINING the project and its results to date, Prof. Worden said: "The investigation is concerned with the effects of air ion concentration on certain physiological processes. This air ion concentration is brought about by the use of special heater-like ionizers which charge the air about us with negative ions."

"Our work at Bonaventure has been directed towards determining the effect of this controlled atmosphere on the alkalinity of the blood, on its capacity to carry oxygen and carbon dioxide, and on the rate of animal growth and tissue repair."

"We have been able to determine that air-ion control can exert many influences on the body. It can affect the gas-carrying capacity of the blood, the rate of growth of animals and the individual organs of animals, and the rate of healing of injured tissue."

According to Prof. Worden, what the Bonaventure researchers want to determine now is the effect of air-ion control on the permeability of tissues and cells in living animals and in cells of tissue "explants." Explants are bits of living tissue removed from the animal body and grown in a synthetic culture medium.

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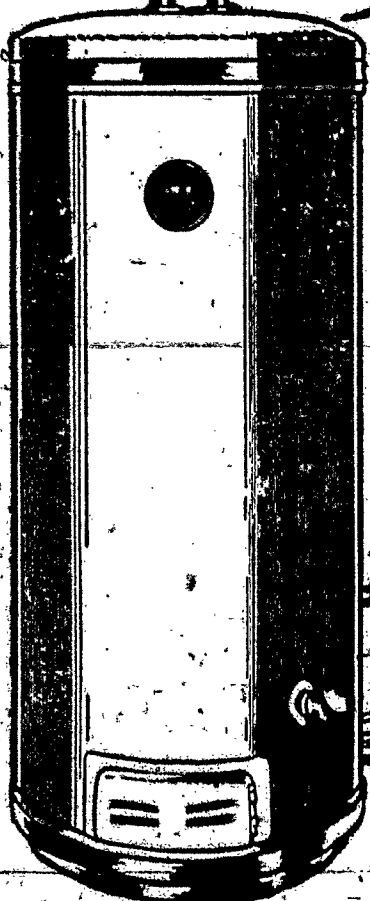
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
