(Continued from Page 7) to the bed had ducked "amen." Outside, in the corridors, were other hens, not setters but tied by a string to the leg and to the window. At least there are eggs now and then.

IN ALL, EVEN the humblest homes, special Easter food, however little of it, was set on the table for the blessing — some eggs, salami, sweet bread, cake and a little wine. And in every case there was an offering for the Church: ten or 20 lire, or even more was given to little Bugenio who carried a small bag as well as holy water. Most of these families were victims of the war-time bombings south of Rome. Some of them had saved quite a bit of furniture to set up house in respectable style even in these circumstances. Others had almost nothing, but were making out. Almost without exception, the homes were cleaned up today, awaiting the visit and the blessing of the priest. The average space — and space? — all that it could be called — showed a double bed surrounded by two, three or other single cots, couches or makeshift sleeping arrangements of one kind or other, a table or stand, a couple of nondescript chairs, a hotplate or an open brazier stove near the window so the smoke could escape. Sometimes — more often in fact — the stoves are kept in the corridors while the hotplates are inside. Such radiators as remain serve as stands or tables. The housing situation in Rome is easing very slightly with new construction. Most of these people are hoping soon to find a home which had originally been intended to serve as a home. After a few moments among these people and in these surroundings it was not hard, indeed, to heed their pleas for a special prayer and to give a spe-
