

Bp. Haas Proposes Price, Wage Plan

Atlantic City, N. J. — (NC) — Establishment of an industry council plan for the fixing of prices and wages as "the best way out of the dilemma" now confronting the nation was recommended by Bishop Francis J. Haas of Grand Rapids, in an address at the biennial convention of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America here.

HE POINTED out that in World War II, wages and prices were fixed by a tripartite board consisting of equal membership of management, labor and government. He added: "Briefly the experience during this emergency was fairly satisfactory, protecting management, labor and consumers."

Bishop Haas contended that free competition, which "means the struggle that goes on without any controls," alone cannot fix wages and prices. He said that in a democratic or any other kind of society, free competition must expect to operate within a rational system of controls. The Bishop added: "We should have a controlled economy, but controlled by those who work and live under it."

THE BISHOP also insisted that government alone should not fix wages and prices, asserting that "such a regime would be nothing less than pure authoritarianism in absolute contradiction to all our concepts of democracy and democratic institutions."

A combination of management, represented by management representatives, of labor, represented by labor representatives, and of government represented by government representatives, offers the best way out of the dilemma," Bishop Haas said.

Let it be made clear that under such a scheme of operation — call it an Industry Council Plan or whatever you will — labor must be able to freely choose its spokesmen; management, its spokesmen; and government, its spokesmen. Moreover, government spokesmen would sit in the role of conciliators to keep the parties together, not to impose the will of government on any

Papal Internuncio Named To Japan

Vatican City — (NC) — The Holy See has named Archbishop Maximilian de Furstenberg as its first Papal Internuncio to Japan. The action followed Japan's emergence as a completely independent nation as the peace treaty came into force.

At the same time His Holiness Pope Pius XII has sent a message of congratulations and good wishes to Emperor Hirohito on the occasion of Japan again becoming an independent nation.

Holy Cross Fathers Get New Province

North Easton, Mass. — (NC) — Authorization has been granted by the Holy See for erection of an eastern United States province of Fathers and coadjutor Brothers of the Holy Cross, with headquarters here.

Acting Provincial is the Rev. James W. Cormerton, C.S.C. Along with a mission band and Stonehill College here, the province operates King's College at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., and Father Baker High School in Lackawanna, N. Y. Holy Cross Fathers of the province also serve the spiritual needs of Catholic students at Rhode Island State College, Kingston, R. I., and are active in east Pakistan and in Chile.

The new province was established as a vice province four years ago. Steady growth in personnel and activities have now made possible the full status of province.

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St. Peter Basilica Official Named

Vatican City — (NC) — Msgr. Primo Pinheira, secretary of the Pontifical Commission for Vatican City, has been named to succeed the late Msgr. Ludwig Kaas as secretary of the Sacred Congregation of the Basilica of St. Peter. It was announced here. The commission is responsible for the upkeep of the great basilica.

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
