

Missioner Hits U.S. Care Of Navajo Indians

New York (NC) — A brochure entitled "The Navajo Problem—A Plot On Modern Civilization" pointing up the plight of the once proud tribe of Indians, has been issued here by the Navajo League, Inc., an Indian missionary organization.

The brochure is culled from facts taken from the Congressional Record and other government sources, according to the Rev. Bernard A. Cullen, Director of the Navajo League. He said that while conditions existing among all tribes of Indians is perplexing, the plight of the Navajos is regarded generally as the most acute.

THE NAVAJOS live on a desert wasteland in Arizona and New Mexico, Father Cullen pointed out. He related that two years ago, as the result of impatient protests from both Catholics

and Protestants, Congress approved a 10-year rehabilitation program for the Navajos. Now, in the second of the 10-year program, he stressed, Congress has reduced the rehabilitation fund so that little can be done to provide much-needed schools and hospitals for the Navajos.

In a "Did You Know" department in the brochure, Father Cullen pointed out that the United States signed a treaty with the Navajos in 1868, which guaranteed that a teacher and classroom would be provided for every 30 children of school age, but that the promises had not been kept.

THE BROCHURE stated that 75 per cent of the Navajo tribe is illiterate, that 65 per cent of the Navajo children receive no formal education and that the median schooling is nine-tenths of one year compared to the national
