Senate Unit Widens Tax Limit On

ate committee has approved an amendment to the Internal Revenue Code raising to 20 per cent the amount of an individual's income that may be exempt from income tax because of contributions to religious, educational, or charitable organizations.

The tax-writing Senate Finance Committee added this far-reaching amendment to a relatively obscure House bill, H.R. 7345, exempting from tax athletic events sponsored for the benefit of the Red Cross.

IN TAKING the action, the committee reported to the Senate that private church-related educational institutions are having a particularly difficult time meet-

ing their budgets. Your committee is of the opinion," said Chairman Walter F. George (D.Ga), in reporting the bill, "that by increasing the present 15 per cent limit to 20 per cent, much-needed relief will be given to colleges, hospitals, and other organizations which are becoming more and more dependent upon private contributions to enable them to belance their budgets and carry on their programs.
