Scientists Suspend Work At Jericho

Jerusalem —(NC)— American and British archeologists exploring the ancient "tel" or mound, covering Biblical Jeriche have suspended their activities until after the summer. During this season, work become next to impossible in the area, which lies 1,300 feet below sea level.

Discoveries made during their excavation have inclined the experts to characterize Jericho as "the most ancient city in the world". They base their contention on the fact that some of its walls appear to be the most ancient discovered anywhere. They outdate even the most primitive pottery, fragments of which are always an frader to a site's age or epoch.
