

## Benefactors of Special School Lauded At Dedication Ceremony

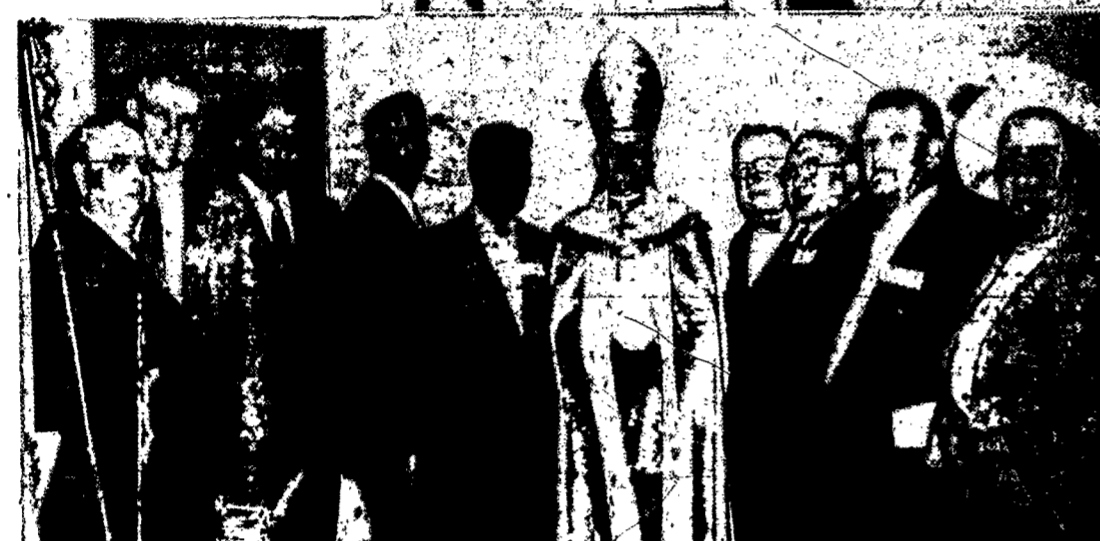
His Excellency Bishop Kearney praised benefactors of the School of the Holy Childhood at the ceremonies Saturday, May 24, when he dedicated the refurbished buildings at 215 Andrews St.

The building refurbished by union workmen who donated time, labor and materials was formerly the grammar school of Our Lady of Victory parish.

The school conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph offers a specially designed course for the slow-learning. Grooming, personality development, cooking, sewing, and budgeting for girls; woodworking, maintenance and printing for the boys; round and square dances taught to mixed classes to increase poise and develop confidence in social living, are included on the curriculum.

SISTER ST. MARK is principal, assisted by Sisters Marie Martin and Michael Marya, full time instructors. Five part-time instructors also teach the 90 pupils from the ages of 10 to 17.

monies by the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, superintendent of the Diocesan Schools, said the school was the outgrowth of work done on a limited scale at Immaculate Conception School. When the demand for such train-

ing became more pressing, larger facilities were sought. The teaching staff will have to be enlarged as the enrollment increases from a large existing waiting list. The adjoining convent will soon be ready for occupancy and a shrine has been erected in the yard. Some children have been graduated and placed in jobs, while others work in part-time jobs.

## Catholic Units To Parade On Memorial Day

Catholic groups are preparing to pay their respects to the honored war dead of this area on Memorial Day, both at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery and in the annual parade.

Invocation at the World War Memorial Plaque ceremonies on Broad St. bridge will be given by the Rev. Elmer Heindl, county chaplain of the American Legion. Catholics will be represented in many of the veteran and auxiliary organizations participating including the Catholic War Veterans.

The third section of the parade will be made up of Catholic high schools headed by the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, superintendent, Catholic schools, Diocese of Rochester.

Aquinas Institute band directed by Raymond J. Hasenauer will precede delegations of Aquinas, Our Lady of Mercy High School, St. Joseph's Commercial School, Nazareth Academy, Sacred Heart Academy and St. Agnes High School.

Members of the CWV will gather to recite the Rosary at St. Francis of Assisi Parish Center, 401 Orange St. at 9:30 p.m. tonight (Thursday, May 29). The Rosary will be led by Donald J. Foley, county commander and will be broadcast over WSAV at 10 p.m.

All Catholic War Veteran post colors will be represented in the Memorial Day parade. Sam Denaro, past Monroe County second vice commander is parade chairman for the CWV assisted by all commanders. Mrs. Armand LeMay will head the CWV auxiliary units.

## St. Augustine Parishioners To Launch \$40,000 Campaign For School Addition

Setting a goal of \$40,000, parishioners of St. Augustine Parish will launch a subscription campaign Monday, June 2, with a dinner for workers at Brook-Lea Country Club. The drive will continue through June 16.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. John M. Duffy, pastor, has announced that the sum will be used for an addition and revamping of the existing school.

The present building which was erected in 1906 has 18 classrooms. The new project will provide four additional classrooms, a meeting room, two offices and a complete renovation of the structure.

John P. Sexton, 229 Warwick Ave., and Mrs. Peter J. Flanagan, 178 Ingleswood Dr., are general chairmen of the drive which will get under way next week. Monsignor Duffy has appointed ten zone leaders for the campaign.

IN A LETTER to parishioners this week, Monsignor Duffy stressed the need that wear and increased registration has created.

He pointed out that he hoped to give "pupils and teachers a fitting place in which to live and to work during the school day."

The pastor asked that pledges be paid in full by October 1, 1952, when bills for the improvements will come due.

## Midnight Mass To Mark Eucharistic Congress

Men of Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society, at St. Patrick's Church, Rochester, will observe "Eucharistic Night" with midnight Mass, as a continuation of "Eucharistic Day" proclaimed by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney to unite his Diocese with the International Eucharistic Congress in Barcelona, Spain, teaching its climax this week end.

Saturday, May 31st, was designated by Bishop Kearney as "Eucharistic Day" throughout the Diocese of Rochester and the Bishop has invited everyone to "participate in this great act of faith in the Real Presence and devotion to the Eucharistic King."

THIS BEING the last Saturday night of the month, men of the Nocturnal Adoration Society through the Diocese will be meeting in their designated churches for their regular hourly vigils throughout the night before the Blessed Sacrament.

As a special observance of this "Eucharistic Night" at St. Patrick's, at midnight the usual spiritual exercises and devotions will be replaced by Holy Mass.

The Rev. Leo C. Mooney, Pastor of St. Patrick's and Moderator of the first local unit of the Nocturnal Adoration Society, which meets each month in his church, will be the celebrant.

In announcing the midnight Mass, Father Mooney stated that this unusual time for the celebration of Holy Mass was arranged with the approval of His Excellency, the Bishop and in accordance with permission granted the Society by the Blessed Sacrament Fathers, under whose jurisdiction the Society operates in the United States.

FATHER MOONEY observed: "It seems most appropriate that members of the Nocturnal Adoration Society, which is essentially a Eucharistic Society, pledged to practice and promote devotion

## Aquinas To 'Build' New India Church

On the bank of the River Cauvery in South India, a new Mission Church will soon be erected in honor of St. Thomas Aquinas.

This Church is being financed by the Aquinas Mission Crusade and according to Bishop James McDonough, of Tiruchirappalli, the building will serve a dual purpose: a Church on Sunday and as a school during the week. The cost of operating the school will be covered by a government grant.

According to the Rev. Arthur Looby, Moderator of the Aquinas Mission Crusade, arrangements for this project were made through Father Justin Divaram, a native Indian Priest who spent last year in the United States seeking aid for the Catholic Church in India.

## Bishop To Visit Sampson Air Base Memorial Day

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will observe Memorial Day, Friday, May 30 with the airmen at Sampson Air Force Base where he will celebrate a Low Mass and offer Benediction.

The Bishop will arrive at the Air Base at 9:30 a.m. and will be met by two Catholic Chaplains and proceed to F. Drill Field.

AT THE DRILL Field the Bishop and his ecclesiastical party will be escorted by Major General N. B. Harbold, commandant of the base, and a color guard to the outdoor altar where the Bishop will vest for the Mass.

Bishop Kearney will preach the sermon and then confirm about 100 airmen. This will be followed by Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament with the Bishop as celebrant.

It is estimated that between 1,500 and 2,000 uniformed airmen will march onto the field in front of the altar for the ceremonies.

WHEN HIS Excellency enters the field the Sampson Air Force Band will play the Ece Sacros and at the consecration the band's brass section will be heard in appropriate fanfare.

Singing at the Mass will be the Nazareth College choir which will join in the Ece Sacros before the Mass.

The Bishop will be accompanied by the Very Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall, diocesan director of the National Catholic Community Service. In charge of arrangements at the base will be Chaplain (Major) Gerard A. Haggerty, S. J.
