Red Propagandists Hits South India

Rome — (RNS) — Communist propaganda is increasing in the South India, especially in the Salem region of Madras Province, according to Fides, official news agency of the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, which exercises jurisdiction over all Roman Catholic mission territory.

The Catholic Church is presented by the Communists, the agency said, as a negligible institution destined to disappear from India in a few years "just as in China."

Fides said that in order to combat the Communist propaganda, priests in the region are organizing study clubs for Catholic youth.

Miss Quinn Wins Fulbright Grant

Coming—Hailed as the outstanding Catholic student at Syracuse University through receiving the Loman prize given by the St. Thomas More Foundation, Miss Margaret Quinn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Quinn of 9 Fyreer St., this city, has also been awarded a Fulbright Fellowship for study at the Sorbonne in Paris.

Miss Quinn, an honor graduate of Northside High School in 1948, will receive her bachelor of arts degree from Syracuse University on June 2. Miss Quinn who entered the University on three scholarships, one a state award, another by the university and the third a state citizenship award, has kept up her remarkable record throughout her college career. Last December she was named Phi Beta Kappa, honorary scholastic fraternity.

Before receiving the Fulbright Fellowship, which will provide for full passage to and from France, full tuition, books, food and clothing allowance as well as other expenses while studying at the Sorbonne, Miss Quinn had been accepted for post-graduate study at Columbia University.

However, she will now go to France in August for a year's study in the field of comparative literature.
