

Grailville Girls Operate Family Service Center

Cincinnati, Ohio. (NC)—Six young women have opened a new Grail Family Service Center here, an unusual lay apostolate enterprise.

When the birth of a new baby or the illness of a parent or child causes a family crisis, the families call Grail House for assistance. The young women go into these homes for short periods to give both the physical and spiritual aid required.

Trained at Grailville, Catholic Community College for lay leadership studies at Loveland, Ohio, the staff of six lives at the center. The young women voluntarily give their earnings, each receiving an allowance from the common fund for personal needs. They find that this enables them to live in a spirit of Christian charity, contributing greatly to their family and spirit de corps.

LAST OCTOBER the six girls began work on an experimental basis under the leadership of Miss Mary Eridg Noland, a Grailville staff worker who has an extensive background in social

service. Since October, the team has been able to meet the needs of 25 families, with an average period of service of five weeks in each family.

The group lived for a time in a rented apartment near their new location, but the work has grown so rapidly that a move to a new and larger center was imperative.

Members of the center give full time to the work. In each family they assume complete responsibility for child care and training, meal planning and preparation, budgeting and general management of the household. They have also been able to encourage family prayer and home-centered recreation, their experience being that the families served here have been most interested in these means for leading a fuller Christian life.

BY LIVING AT THE center, called Grail House, and going out to families during the day, the girls experience a pattern of Christian family living together. They attend Mass each morning and share work, study and recreation. In addition, they participate in lectures, weekends and short courses on the family apostolate held at Grailville during the year.

Grail House also serves as a center for apostolic meetings and activities for the young women of Cincinnati.

AMONG WOMEN

Unsung Praises

The Chairman of the Inter-American Relations Committee of the National Council of Catholic Women has just issued an encouraging and interesting report on conditions as she found them on a recent visit to Mexico. Most of us can remember the terrible persecution endured in modern times by Mexican Catholics and so we read with interest of definitely improving conditions for the Church in our neighbor republic to the South.

The committee reports in part that the original name has been restored to the Villa de Guadalupe. In the heat of anti-religious hatred the name of the town where the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe is located was changed by a bill of Congress on January 6, 1932 to Villa Guadalupe A. Madero.

IN SEPTEMBER OF 1943 a petition signed by millions of citizens, requesting the restoration of the original name, was presented to the Mexican government.

This petition was ignored until last December when the Mexican Congress voted to restore the original name. There was a solemn Mass of thanksgiving a great pilgrimage to the Basilica and a copy of the Congressional

law was laid at the feet of the Virgin of Guadalupe.

Much of the stirring of public interest in behalf of the Church with the end of effecting the abolition of discriminatory laws has been carried on by the Catholic Action groups of Mexico. They have spearheaded an intensive campaign waged by parents, clubs and societies to abolish Article III of the Mexican Constitution. This article prohibits religious schools and proves for their consecration by the government.

Also in the field of education the first Catholic University to be founded in Mexico in over a hundred years, the Universidad de la America Espanola has been opened this year. In journalism where so much good or evil can be done, a School of Journalism founded three years ago by the Accion Catolica Mexicana graduates its first class, fifteen young men and women.

Very few of these good solid accomplishments are ever reported in our secular press. Occasionally a weekly news magazine will publish some account with a human interest or unusual angle but the day by day battle of returning all things to Christ often shows little of the spectacular to make it news worthy for our secular newspaper readers.

Here is that a great national organization such as the National Council of Catholic Women through its literally-millions of contacts with women all over the world, but particularly American can report through our Catholic Press of the work done at hand and far away, of the victories large and small accomplished by a zealous lay apostolate working always under the guidance of our Bishops and priests.
