

Bishop Confers Diplomas On 18 Nurses In Hornell

Hornell—The nurse has little chance for success unless she appreciates the spiritual aspects of her vocation. His Excellency Bishop Keane today conferred diplomas on 18 graduates of St. James Mercy Hospital School of Nursing Sunday.

In the class were 17 regular graduates and one in X-ray Technology. The church was well filled with relatives and friends for the commencement exercises.

"THE NURSE views her profession from a purely natural sense, she loses the Romance of her vocation," Bishop Keane said. "The Romance stems from Jesus Christ Himself."

His Excellency explained that nursing has been different from all other vocations throughout the centuries.

"It was given dignity by Christ, the Great Healer, in His regard of the care of the sick as a spiritual work of mercy."

The demands upon a nurse's patience, kindness and sympathy are so great, the Bishop continued, that they can scarcely be fulfilled without a true appreciation of spiritual values.

"The medicine of compassion and human tenderness means so much more than a purely technical knowledge," he said. "The best equipment for a good nurse is not listed in books. It embodies the most concept of motherhood—self sacrifice, generosity and tenderness."

BECAUSE OF THE spiritual requirements for success in the nursing profession, it is "very appropriate that graduation exercises be held in church," the Bishop said.

"It is a privilege to impart to you graduates God's blessing with a prayer for His assistance in the coming years."

"No matter what altar you kneel before, ask God in the silence of your hearts to be with you in each task. You may then, he concluded, "and assured that you will never be without His help."

THE GRADUATES were presented to the Bishop by the Rev. Leo E. Lynch, chaplain of St. James Mercy Hospital. They approached the sanctuary of the church where the Bishop, from a throne draped in gold brocade and red velvet, presented diplomas.

Graduates entered and left the church in solemn procession, accompanied by priests, Sisters of Mercy, alumni, nursing staff members and students. The Bishop, wearing a vivid red velvet cape, in observance of the Feast of Pentecost, imparted his blessing to the congregation and guests.

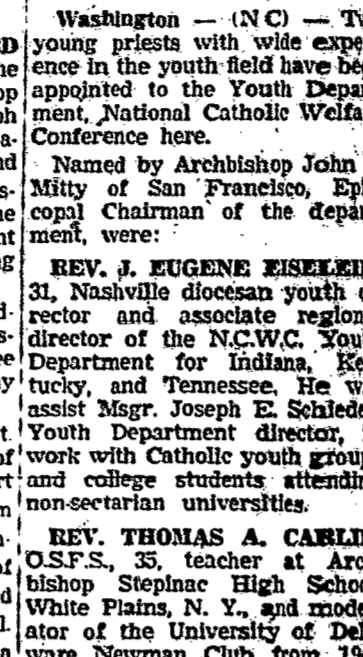


The youth of the parish are trying to raise funds in order to obtain equipment for the different sports. This will benefit our parish recreation program for the children teen agers.
