THE Holy Father's Society for the Propagation of the Faith trains 64 missionaries in the missionary world, each of which averages as large as the State of New York. It aids every missionary society in the world to help maintain their 44,000 elementary schools, 174 leprosantries and 3,182 dispensaries. The sacrifices you make are sent directly to Rome to be distributed by the Holy Father Himself to the missionaries. . . . China is our greatest worry. There were 143 dioceses or prefectures apostolic in China a few years ago. After 4 years, 61 Bishops remain but they are not allowed to have any contact with their faithful and are under house arrest. This is equivalent to the destruction of all the Cathedrals, schools, orphanages, convents, hospitals and monasteries in 57% of the dioceses of the United States with 43% of the Bishops under house arrest. Pictures of Archbishops and Bishops of the United States in prison, 7 of them dying in prison and you have some idea of the persecution in China! The number of priests known to be in Chinese prisons is at least 300.

Growing with thorns has recently been revived by the young Communists in China who demanded also that Sister Superior of the Catholic hospital in Chaochung be crucified. The Devil is the invisible head of the Mystical Body of the anti-Christ and Stalin is its visible head. . . . Years ago, Lenin said: "Remember, the shortest route to Paris passes through Peking, China." By this, he meant that Europe would be conquered after Asia was conquered. 85% of the population of the world is today under Communist control! What does this mean to you? Do you depend on politicians to stop Communism. . . . It takes a faith to meet a faith; a belief in Christ to overcome a belief in anti-Christ. This faith in Christ becomes concrete only in prayer and sacrifice. . . . If you had a World Mission Rosary and each day the yellow beads reminded you, of China, Korea and Vietnam, you would pray for these people. At your request and a \$5 offering, we will send you one blessed by me. . . . When the Irish Catholics were persecuted they brought the faith to America. Today, the persecuted Chinese Catholics are bringing the faith to Formosa. Since 1945, the increase in the number of Catholics is 40%. 1,500 converts are under instruction, 250 of whom are university students.

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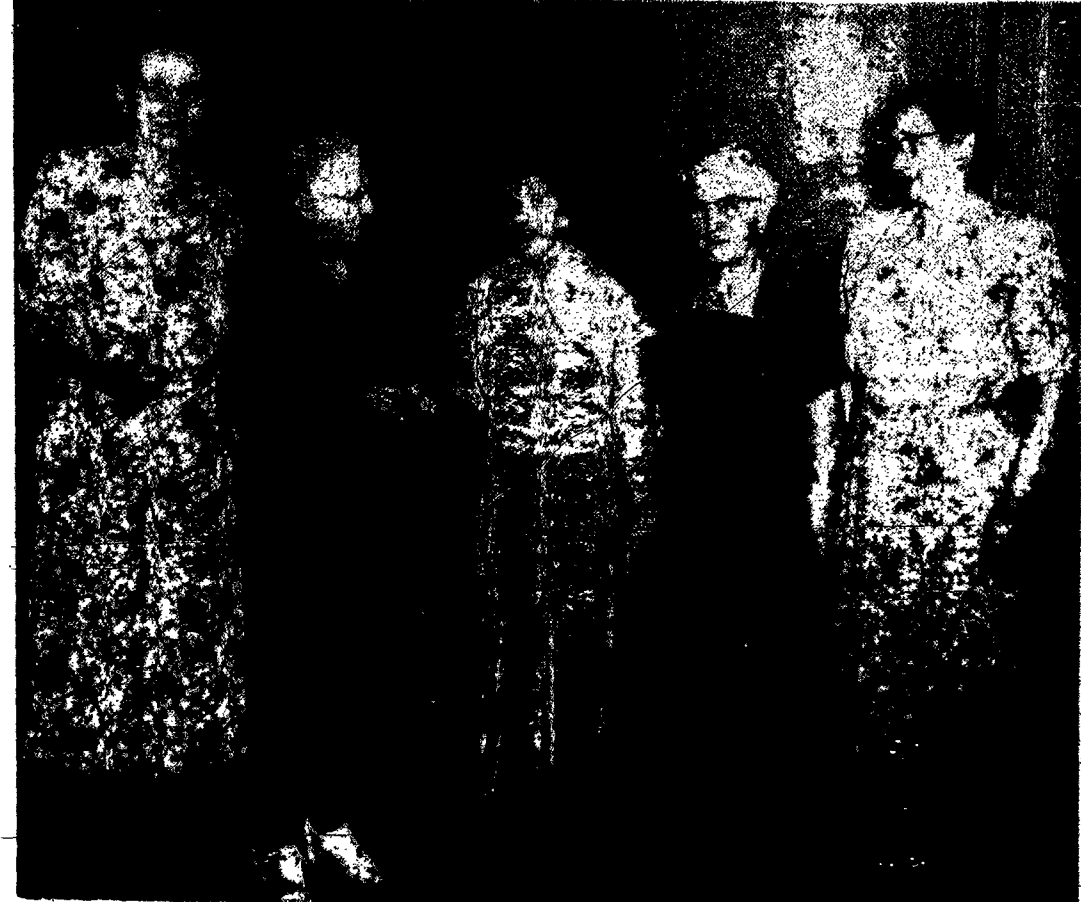
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Original Nurse Alumnae Reunite

Newsprint Cost Rise Said Blow To Catholic Press

The Catholic Press will be hard hit by the \$10-a-ton rise in newsprint costs, Very Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall, Catholic Press Association newspaper committee chairman, stated in New York City. The managing editor of The Catholic Courier-Journal and also CPA secretary, in a statement published in The Catholic Journalist, CPA official organ, scored the mill increase as "wholly unjustified." He added: "Catholic publishers should support strongly any measures taken by the general newspaper press to protect the price rise."

HE ESTIMATED the increase will cost the nation's Catholic Press about \$250,000 a year. National papers like The Register, he declared, will pay around \$35,000 extra a year, while the bill for Our Sunday Visitor will be upped about \$20,000. Smaller publications like The Catholic Virginian of Richmond, Va., will pay about \$600 extra a year, he said. "The newsprint increase puts a further squeeze especially on our larger newspapers," Monsignor Randall said, "and constitutes a grave threat to the Catholic Press."

William Noonan Gets Villanova Degree

Chapel First On Building Program Of Benedictines

Beginning of a building program at Mount Saviour Monastery, Madigan Road (off the Caton Road) in Big Flats, near Elmira to start with a chapel was announced today by Very Rev. Damasus Wirzen, prior of the community.

"The first thing will be a chapel, to be followed by a wing of the monastery," Father Damasus said. "We promised that if Our Lady would help us get the site, our first building project would be a chapel dedicated to God's glory under her patronage as 'Queen of Peace'."

"The purpose of the chapel (oratory, place of prayer, as we like to call it, using St. Benedict's terminology) is not only to serve the monastic community. It is to be a shrine of peace."

PLANS submitted by Joseph Sanford Stanley, architect, of New York, have been accepted. The chapel will be built somewhat behind and to the west of the present farmhouse-monastery (the former Joseph Hofbauer residence) at the top of Madigan Road.

It will be octagonal in shape, 53 feet across and rising to an interior height of 30 feet. A spiral of stainless steel, 40 feet high will crown the chapel. There will be a crypt, or lower church, under the chapel and here in the center will be the shrine of Our Lady Queen of Peace.

Six side altars will be installed in the crypt. On the main floor of the chapel will be the choir and sanctuary, with a high altar in the middle and the altar of the Blessed Sacrament at the back. Besides the space for visitors in the octagonal chapel, extra space will be provided by a narthex, or ante-chapel, which can be opened into the main chapel by a sliding wall. This area can also be used for lectures, conferences, showing films and slides of religious significance and the playing of liturgical music.

"THE AD," Father Damasus said, "is to make this oratory as beautiful as possible, where the entire arrangement will suggest deep reverence and also the firmness and intensity of the prayers of those who gather about the altar and the shrine of the Queen of Peace." The choir will be designed to accommodate 20 monks but so that it can easily be increased to double the capacity.
