Valley Forge Shrine Nearing Completion

Valley Forge, Pa. — (RNS) — A memorial to Catholic service-men of all wars is nearing completion at Valley Forge, a Fenn-sylvania State Park, and the na-tion's greatest's strine to the troops of the Revolutionary War. Although only half completed, several thousand Catholic War Veterans from this state were given a preview of the shrine church at a cornerstone and flagraising ceremony. Auxiliary Bishop Joseph M. Senate Hikes Charity Deduction To 20 Per Cent For Income Tax

Washington —(NC)—Individuals would be permitted to deduct up to a fifth of their income for gifts of charity under a bill passed by the Senate.

At present only 15 per cent of income may be deducted for this purpose under tax pro-

The Senate amended House measure to increase the deduction to 20 per cent. The bill now goes to conference. In the House bill, proceeds of sports programs conducted

for the benefit of the American National Red Cross were excluded from gross incomes for income tax purposes. Object of this provision was to allow professional baseball clubs to devote a day's proceeds to the Red Cross.

Senator George of Georgia, chairman of the Senate Finames Committee, explained on the floor that many other chartitles wished to be included in the Red Cross provision. Her said, however, that it would defeat the provision's purpose if titey were included, since the baseball clubs could not afford to give away successive days of their income for different charities.
