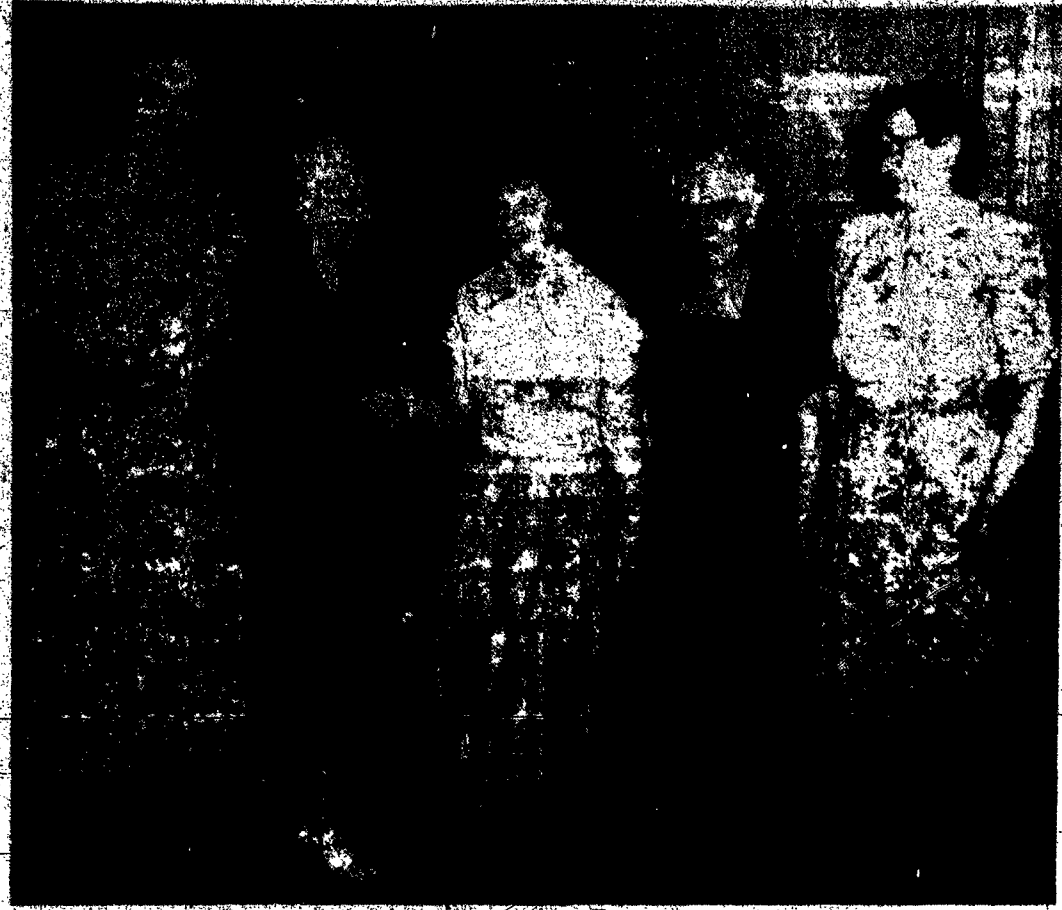


Original Nurse Alumnae Reunite

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Senate Hikes Charity Deduction To 30 Per Cent For Income Tax

Washington, (N.C.)—Individuals would be permitted to deduct up to a fifth of their income for gifts of charity under a bill passed by the Senate.

At present only 15 per cent of income may be deducted for this purpose under tax provisions.

The Senate amended a House measure to increase the deduction to 30 per cent. The bill now goes to conference.

In the House bill, proceeds of sports programs conducted for the benefit of the American National Red Cross were excluded from gross income for income tax purposes. Object of this provision was to show congressional hostility to sports which are a day's proceeds in the Red Cross.

Senator George of Georgia, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, explained in

the floor that many other charities wished to be included in the Red Cross provision. He said, however, that it would defeat the provision's purpose if they were included, since the baseball clubs could not afford to give away successive days of their income for different charities.

At the same time, the chairman said, "the committee was of the opinion that many hospitals, small colleges, and charitable institutions were very helpful in various communities." Consequently, the committee amended the bill to provide the larger individual tax deduction for charity.

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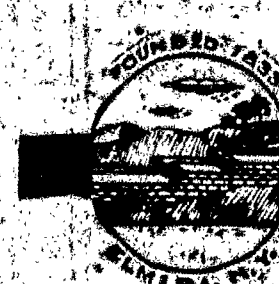
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
