

778 Catholic High Seniors Given Diplomas By Bishop In Rochester

Diplomas and awards were presented by His Excellency Bishop Kearney to a total of 778 graduates of four Rochester Catholic high schools at separate commencement exercises conducted by the schools.

"The world will be richer for your presence," His Excellency Bishop Kearney told graduates at the commencement exercises.

Reminding them that they, the graduates of Catholic high schools, are not at a loss, as we many today, for a measure with which to interpret life, Bishop Kearney said, "But you know what the world means. You have the Eternal Truth. You have light to carry to the world. Let your light shine before men," they were told. "Your way is certain because God is your light."

RECALLING TO the graduates the need today for right concepts of right and wrong to God and Man, the Bishop urged, "faithfulness to the lessons taught you." Referring to the spiritual gift of Faith as a free gift from God to us, His Excellency said that first "This gift of Faith fell into disregard, then faithfulness itself fell into disregard." Fidelity, he continued, is built up thru the years. He cautioned, build up fidelity, be true to the very finest that is in you."

Vacation Schools Set In 28 Parishes Says Fr. Schnacky

Twenty-eight Religious Vacations Schools will be conducted in the Diocese of Rochester under the auspices of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine according to the Rev. Albert E. Schnacky, diocesan director.

Prospects are bright for these summer classes which are primarily conducted to instruct Catholic children attending public schools in the fundamentals of their faith.

BECAUSE OF the growing number of children, the attendance at the schools, most of which will open on Monday, July 7, is expected to exceed last year. The classes are conducted in parish halls and also out-of-doors where at all practical, Father Schnacky said.

Coloring projects and some craft work are carried on in the classes and the schools are open in the mornings.

Members of various religious communities furnish most of the teachers including the Sisters of St. Joseph, Sisters of Mercy and Trinitarian Sisters. The Daughters of St. Vincent de Paul, (Charity Sisters) carry on the work in Churchville. In Ithaca, the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart, primarily a catechetical order, will conduct the classes.
